PREFACE

St Joseph's University is the result of the upgradation of St Joseph's College (Autonomous) under the *Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan* (RUSA) scheme 2.0 of the MHRD (now The Ministry of Education). The scheme was launched by the MHRD in 2013. RUSA's purpose was to create new universities by upgrading existing autonomous colleges. In 2018, St Joseph's was chosen to be one of the first colleges to undergo this upgrade. Following this, on 23rd February 2021, the Government of Karnataka passed the St Joseph's University Bill (now St Joseph's University Act, 2021), paving the way for the College to become a University with a difference. This process came to its culmination on 2nd July 2022 with the Karnataka State Government's commencement notification formally declaring the Institution a University. Thus, in 2022, in the 140th year of the Institution and the year of the completion of 75 years of Indian Independence, St Joseph's College (Autonomous), Bengaluru, was officially upgraded to the status of a university, making it the first-of-its-kind Public-Private Partnership University (PPP model), the third Jesuit University in the country and the first Jesuit University in South India.

The Institution was originally founded as St Joseph's College in 1882 by a group of French Christian priests belonging to the Paris-based Foreign Mission who came to Bangalore and established St Joseph's College with the desire to serve the marginalised and provide them with quality education. In 1937, the management of the Institution was transferred to the Society of Jesus or the Jesuits and came to be registered under the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society® (BJES), built on the principles of St Ignatius of Loyola, a Spanish priest who founded this Catholic religious order in 1540. Ever since, following in the footsteps of their patron St Ignatius, the members of the Society of Jesus have been actively involved in the field of education across the globe.

St Joseph's University, Bengaluru, [previously St Joseph's College (Autonomous), Bengaluru], a 141-year-old Institution, is one of the most prestigious and famous Jesuit educational institutions of higher education in India and one of the largest Jesuit educational institutions in the country. It opens its gates to every student irrespective of caste, tribe, creed and gender. The socio-economically marginalised groups receive special preference here. Over the 141 years of its glorious legacy, SJC (now SJU) has championed the cause of the poor and the marginalised, quality and equitable education for the disadvantaged, community service, and inclusivity at all levels. The Institution offers UG, PG, PhD and PG Diploma programmes, including professional and vocational programmes, and they are diversified over several pertinent fields of knowledge. With a green campus set in the heart of the city, the Institution enjoys student and staff diversity, PhD qualified staff members, recognised PhD guides and several research scholars working under them backed by earmarked research corpus. Other best practices of the Institution include support services for the differently-abled with assistive software, scholarships/freeships for students from deprived backgrounds, a midday meal scheme, environmental consciousness, greener practices and academically productive linkages with other institutions and organisations both at the national and international levels.

1. ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

1.1. OBJECTIVES

I. Academic Excellence

St Joseph's University places a high value on academic excellence. The courses are rigorous and need daily application of effort. Presentations and participation in seminars and workshops are part of academic life and train students in critical and scientific thinking. Students are encouraged to join at least one of the many associations of the University and thus experience intellectual growth and develop a spirit of inquiry.

II. Social Concern

Preparing persons for the service of others is the aim of education at St Joseph's University. Social concern is at the heart of the education philosophy at St Joseph's. Great emphasis is laid on ensuring that students are aware of the many social ills and injustices prevalent in our society. Students are expected to be considerate of people who are less privileged and oppressed and be persons of concern, compassion and conscience.

III. Character Formation

Character development is an essential aspect of education. Character includes behaviour, values, and attitudes to life and others. Essential to any character formation is self-discipline. The rules of discipline in the University are meant for social well-being, order, and harmony.

1.2. TIMELINE AND MILESTONES

1882	A group of French Christian priests belonging to the Paris-based Foreign Mission, inspired by Jesus, came to Bengaluru and founded St Joseph's College. One of the most gifted of these French priests was Fr James Maurice Vissac, who could very well be called the founder of St Joseph's College. Fr
	Vissac was appointed the Principal of St Joseph Seminary on St John's Hill. He began transforming the seminary into a full-fledged college affiliated with the University of Madras. Affiliation was granted in the same year, 1882, and St Joseph's College was born.
1884	The College produced its first graduates. Soon classes were transferred to the newly built building on St John's Hill, which still survives today and is the home of Saint Germaine's High School, Bengaluru.
1894- 1898	Between 1894 and 1898, Fr Vissac was busy supervising the construction of a new building on Museum Road to house both the High School and the College. In 1898, the College moved to the new building.
1914	The first world war broke out, and scores of Josephites went to fight for the British Empire in the trenches and battlefields of Europe. In France and Belgium, many lost their lives in the war. Even during this destructive period in world history, a new two-storey building went up on Museum Road, and the Indian High School moved into it.
1903	Fr Louis Froger took over from Fr Vissac. Fr Froger gave the College its motto, "Faith and Toil", as

	well as the College Emblem.
1923	The College moved to the newly added second floor of the Museum Road building.
1924	Fr J Argaut took over as principal, and St Joseph's was elevated to the status of a First Grade College by Madras University.
1925	A marvellous new building exclusively to house the College came up on Residency Road, and the College moved into it the same year with the enrolment of 350 students.
1926	The University of Madras accorded the Institution the status of a 'First Grade College'. The same year students were admitted to the University of Madras BA programme.
1937	By an agreement between Bishop Despatures of Mysore and the representative of the superior general of the Society of Jesus in India, the Foreign Mission Society of Paris transferred the management of the College to the Society of Jesus on 1 st June 1937 after 55 years of administering the Institution. Rev Fr A Ambruzzi, an Italian Jesuit, became the first Principal and Rector of the College. The same year Nobel Laureate Sir C V Raman visited the College and gave a highly illuminating lecture on the Italian inventor and engineer Guglielmo Marconi who had just died that year.
1938	Work began on the building of a new astronomical observatory on top of the main building, undertaken by Fr Erolde and built by Mr S T Narayan Rao. The same year the College acquired a Vicentini, which was housed in a newly built seismograph room at the North end of the College. The same academic year also witnessed the construction of the Chemistry Lab.
1945	The upper floor of the Chemistry Lab was built.
1947	On 15 August 1947, the College hoisted a glorious new flag of independent India on the pinnacle of their College building.
1949	Following the reorganisation of States, the College was affiliated with the University of Mysore. The magnificent new hostel building at Langford Road design was also inaugurated.
1953	Another building to house the Commerce section came up opposite the hostel.
1958	The College celebrated its diamond jubilee. The Principal Fr C Andrade and former principal Fr Boniface D'Souza escorted the chief guest, His Excellency Jayachamarajendra Wadiyar, the Governor of the State and the last Maharaja of Mysore. The other distinguished guest for the occasion was one of the giants of Kannada literature K V Putappa, better known as Kuvempu.
1964	The Institution was affiliated with Bangalore University.
1967	The Institution was granted permanent affiliation to Bangalore University.
1972	The commerce sections and Evening College sections were separated to form St Joseph's College of Commerce and St Joseph's Evening College, respectively.
1982	On 23 December 1982, the College proudly celebrated its centenary and the President of India, His Excellency Dr Neelam Sanjeeva Reddy, addressed a large gathering on the campus. The Institution also received UGC recognition (UGC Act 1956): 2(f) status.
The 80s	In the 80s, under the leadership of Fr Joseph Nelapathy, the College inaugurated a host of new disciplines such as Computer Science, Electronics, Environmental Science and Microbiology. Many departments began offering honours and certificate courses to students interested in doing advanced-level studies with a research orientation. Postgraduate courses in Chemistry and Botany were started during this period.
1985	On 28 May 1985, the Institution received another UGC recognition (UGC Act 1956): 12(B) status.
1986	In 1986, the College became the first affiliated college in Karnataka to offer postgraduate programmes.

1998	The College became the first affiliated institution to get Research Centre status.
1999	On 9 October 1999, the College was accredited with 4 stars (Score 70-75%) by NAAC in Cycle 1.
2000	The College was granted comprehensive accreditation by the NAAC.
2001	By the directive of the state government (the Karnataka state policy of bifurcation), the PUC and Degree sections became independent of each other. The Pre-University section was evolved to become St Joseph's PU College and the degree sections were shifted to the new buildings at No. 36, Lalbagh Road, Bengaluru. The buildings on this campus were built to serve as the new home of St Joseph's College.
2004	On 3 November 2004, St Joseph's was declared by the UGC as a "College with Potential for Excellence (CPE).
2005	The Institution became an Autonomous College, one of the first colleges in Karnataka to be granted this status. It was granted Autonomous status up to 2010-11. New postgraduate programmes in several Humanities disciplines were also introduced.
2006	On 2 February 2006, the College was reaccredited with an 'A' Grade (Score 85.3%) by NAAC in the 2^{nd} Cycle.
2007	The College celebrated 125 years of its establishment, and the chief guest for the 125 th anniversary was Sri Somnath Chatterjee, the then Speaker of the Lok Sabha.
2009	On 1 August 2009, a commemorative postal stamp of the College was released by the Department of Posts, India, to commemorate the 125 th Post-Centenary Celebration of its establishment.
2010	An extension of autonomous status was granted from 2010-11 to 2015-16.
2012	On 10 March 2012, the Institution was accredited with an 'A' grade (CGPA of 3.73/4; Score 93.25%) by NAAC in the 3 rd Cycle. The same year the Institution celebrated the Platinum Jubilee of its administration by the Jesuit Order.
2014	The Institution was conferred with the status of 'College of Excellence' (CE) by UGC. The Auditorium Complex was inaugurated.
2015	The Institution was granted the status of DST-FIST College.
2016	The Institution received an extension of autonomous status, which was granted from 2016-2017 to 2021-2022 by UGC.
2017	On 30 October 2017, the College was re-accredited with A++ Grade and 3.79/4 CGPA in the 4 th Cycle by NAAC. Postgraduate Science Departments were awarded the DST-FIST grants.
2018	Magis Block was inaugurated by the 31 st Superior General Rev Fr Arturo Sosa Abascal SJ, and the Departments of Biotechnology, Chemistry and Botany were elevated to Star Status under the DBT Star College scheme. The same year, St Joseph's College (Autonomous) was selected to be a University under the RUSA scheme by the MHRD (now Ministry of Education-MoE).
2021	St Joseph's University Bill was passed in the Karnataka Legislative Assembly, and the same year the SJU Bill became the St Joseph's University Act, 2021.
2022	The MHRD-Ministry of Human Resource Development (now the MOE- Ministry of Education) upgraded the College to a University under RUSA 2.0 Scheme, and on 2 nd July 2022, notification from the Government of Karnataka officially declared the Institution as St Joseph's University. The centenary celebration of the Alumni/ae Association was held in February 2023. The Institution was bestowed with 2(f) status as a University.

5.RESOURCES FOR STAFF AND STUDENTS

5.1. FACILITIES ON CAMPUS

Infrastructure

Library

St Joseph's University Arrupe Library and Information Centre is a well-stocked library on the third floor of the Academic Block that caters to the needs of undergraduate, postgraduate, and research staff and students. The library is regularly updated with recent and relevant books, journals and eresources across all disciplines.

Laboratories

Well-equipped laboratories are available for all science disciplines on the undergraduate as well as postgraduate campuses. Great emphasis is placed on imparting hands-on skills to students. State-of-the-art studios with high-end equipment and best-in-class editing suites for both video editing and sound design, are provided for students of Visual Communication, Film making, and Animation courses. A Language learning facility and Material Production Centre are available for use by students of Journalism courses.

Computer And Networking Facilities

A computer and networking facility is housed in the library and is available for use by undergraduate and postgraduate students. A networking facility funded by the Department of Science and Technology, GoI (DST-FIST) grant has been set up on the 2nd floor of the Magis Block. This facility is available for faculty and students for research and project work.

Hostels

In order to accommodate boys and girls from other states, the University runs three hostels. The hostels on campus and at Ejipura provide boarding facilities for 150 boys. Girls can avail of hostel facilities at Sneha Nilaya, run by Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate with whom the University has an MoU.

Canteen/Cafeteria

The food courts on the third floor of the Magis Block offer delicious food and meals at affordable prices. There are separate canteens in the postgraduate block and at Arrupe Block for the convenience of students in these blocks.

Auditorium And Seminar Halls

The St Joseph's University Auditorium complex on the undergraduate campus houses a state-of-the-art auditorium that houses 1100 people, besides multiple smaller seminar halls that can be used for conferences, seminars and meetings of different audience sizes. The Xavier Hall and Audio-Visual room on the postgraduate campus are also used for hosting meetings and events that cater to a variety of disciplines.

Campus Wi-Fi

The campus is Wi-Fi enabled, and high-speed Wi-Fi is available in all academic blocks for use by faculty and students.

Observatory

The university has two astronomical observatories. One is housed atop the Science block and employs a 12-inch Cassegrain Telescope mounted on an equatorial system in the Ritchie Cretian mode. The second observatory is located on the terrace of the PG Block and has an 8-inch telescope in the Schmidt-Cassegrain mode having a focal ratio of f/10 with Dual-Fork, Alt-Azimuth mounting. Sky-watching programs are organised regularly during the clear sky season. In Bangalore, this usually falls between the months between December and May.

Sports & Games Facilities

St Joseph's University has carved out a name for itself in sports and games. The University has well-equipped basketball and badminton courts, a football field, and a gymnasium. Students are encouraged to participate in inter-class, inter-collegiate and University tournaments. Students should enrol themselves with the Physical Education Director or Sports Coaches for regular practice, which is a requirement for selection into the sports and games teams.

Health Centre

First aid facilities are provided in all the blocks of the campus. There is an infirmary in the Arrupe Block. The University has an MoU with St Philomena's Hospital for all medical emergencies.

Bank & ATM

The extension counter of South Indian Bank operates on the University campus. An ATM of South Indian Bank is situated on the PG campus for use by students and staff.

Photocopying and Stationery

The campus has a photocopying facility for the staff and the students at a nominal fee in the library. Photocopying and printing facility is also available in the stationery store. Notebooks and stationery are available in the stationery store on the University campus.

Student Scholarships

The Counselling and Wellness team is committed to providing empathetic, non-judgmental, and genuine support. The emphasis is on enhancing the emotional well-being and empowering students. The counselling service on campus has a team of compassionate therapists who are devoted and use evidence-based interventions to help students develop effective coping skills. All sessions are kept confidential and anonymous.

Placements and Skill Development Cell

The University has a placement cell that provides students with information on careers and jobs. Besides arranging placements (on and off-campus), the cell also organises interviews, career counselling, career mapping, internships, and aptitude tests for final year students.

Campus Ministry

The Campus Ministry at St Joseph's University is a vibrant team of teaching faculty who take care of the corporal and spiritual needs of students and staff members. At the spiritual level, Holy Mass is organised every Friday with special emphasis on first Friday masses. Four special masses are celebrated for the inauguration of the academic year, the feasts of St Joseph, St Ignatius of Loyola and Christmas.

The Campus Ministry organises HRD classes for non-Catholic students and theology classes for second-semester Catholic students.

All India Catholic University Federation (AICUF), under the guidance of the Campus Ministry, has its own coordinators and is involved in organising masses, as well as various outreach programmes, organising MAGIS, and attending workshops and conferences. A group consisting of all religious faculty and students from various congregations in the University named 'SJU Religious' also comes under the auspices of the ministry. The group helps in organising masses and talks. They pray together, have adoration, recite the rosary and conduct spiritual exercises. The Campus Ministry also takes care of the mid-day meal scheme.

The Josephite Research Forum

The Josephite Research Forum (JRF) encourages the exchange of ideas and enables undergraduate students across disciplines (Sciences, Commerce, and Humanities) to do short research projects. Undergraduate students and faculty of various disciplines are active members of the forum. Eligible research proposals may be funded by the DBT (Department of Biotechnology, Government of India) Star College grant. I and II year students can subsequently submit this research work as a term paper.

The Bembala Outreach Programme

In order to form 'Men and Women for and with others', the University provides a space for the students to engage in various social action programmes (and extension activities). The Outreach Programme is mandatory and is part of the basic curriculum and a course completion requirement of the University. The allotted hours for the outreach activities are: 60 hours for UG and 40 hours for PG.

The primary objective of the Outreach Programme is to provide students with a platform to explore and develop the art of critical thinking, leadership skills and techniques of making meaningful interventions to build a just and equitable society.

Staff-Student Rapport

Our lives are influenced and shaped by the people with whom we constantly interact. Here at SJU, your teachers will play a very important role in mentoring and guiding you. You can benefit from their rich experience and knowledge by interacting with them both in and out of the classroom. All classes will have one or two mentors. The role of the Class Mentor is to support and monitor student progress and provide advice and support to the students under their care on academic, co-curricular and extracurricular matters.

Class Mentors

The Latin phrase *Cura Personalis* is a significant Jesuit value at the core of all Jesuit academic endeavours. The value aptly describes the relationship between teachers and students at SJU. The

phrase translates as 'Care for the whole person.' The mentor offers help, emotional support, guidance, and motivation to the students while they spend their time at SJU. The mentor must be the link between the student and the department, the course teachers, and parents. The mentor will be required to apprise the students of all facilities that are made available for them on campus. The role of a mentor in SJU is an important one as it involves forming a long-term relationship with students to encourage and empower their personal growth. Each class has one or two class mentors whose role is to support and guide students and contribute to the overall development of their mentees.

III Shift

The III Shift is an incredible opportunity available to working students and individuals facing financial challenges, although it is open to everyone. Shift III is a program specially designed to cater to the needs of working students and those who require financial assistance. We understand the importance of education and believe that financial constraints should not hinder one's ability to pursue their academic goals. Therefore, we have created Shift III as a platform to support and empower individuals from all walks of life.

Placements

- With an overall placement rate of 87 per cent, St Joseph's University placement drive was a huge success in the year 2022-23. SJU's Placement Office held four skill development training programmes to improve students' employability in various areas including technical and soft skills, and personality development. As of today, 256 companies are associated with SJU placement. This year, the highest CTC offered to our students was Rs. 21 lakhs per year.
- The Josephite HIRE Josephite, an online student portal, provides students with access to the most recent job opportunities and allows students to connect with employers and apply for various job openings.
- The Placement Office co-hosted seven webinars and discussions with industry leaders such as Cognizant and Wipro. These sessions provided students with valuable insights into the industry and helped them understand the latest trends and requirements of the job market.
- 876 of its students took the Wheebox National Employability Test. Of these, 73 per cent of our students received a high percentile on the test indicating that they are prepared to enter the labour force.
- Representatives from several regional colleges gathered at SJU for an Inter-College Placement
 Officers Meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to create a platform for placement officers to
 share information. The SJU Placement Office proposed the establishment of a forum to facilitate
 information sharing among college placement officers. The forum will be used for discussions,
 brainstorming solutions, and sharing placement strategies. Representatives from the meeting
 welcomed the proposal and agreed to participate actively in the forum.



Farewell Day

- The first academic year of the institution as a university kickstarted in August with the first Lectio Brevis of SJU for all the teaching and non-teaching staff. The staff were addressed by the honourable guest for the event, eminent Jesuit scientist Fr Dr Ignacimuthu SJ, the Director of the Xavier Research Foundation of St Xavier's College, Palayamkottai, who is ranked 10th among Indian scientists and listed among the top 1% of the world's scientists in biology.
- The first student orientation programme of SJU was organised for all the I-Year UG and PG students and the III Shift students.
- The first-ever Institution get-together of retired staff and newly-wed couples was held in the Institution. 70 retired staff and 15 newly-wed couples attended the programme.
- The feast of St Ignatius of Loyola was celebrated with the Eucharist followed by a special talk by Fr Jerry Rosario SJ highlighting the 500th year of the cannonball moment and the Ignatian year.
- On the occasion of the birthday of the 19th Dalai Lama, a cultural programme "Footprints 2022" was organised by the North East and Tibetan Students Forum (NETSF) to showcase their rich culture as well as the challenges of the common people.
- Visages, the annual intercollegiate fest was held for two days.
- The Alumni/ae the Institution in collaboration with St Martha's Hospital organised a medical camp for all the staff.
- The first Student Council Election of the University for the academic year 2022-23 was conducted. The Investiture Ceremony of the Student Council 2022-23 was held in the presence of Dr M V Rajeev Gowda, an alumnus, former MP in the Rajya Sabha and a national spokesperson for the Indian National Congress.
- To celebrate unity in diversity, the Institution organised an interreligious prayer to celebrate Diwali. Dr Mudnakudu Chinnaswamy was the Chief Guest.

- The Thanksgiving Eucharist for the Inauguration of SJU was followed by a Thanksgiving Programme, which was attended by Sri CH Pratap Reddy IPS, Commissioner of Police, Sri Sandeep Patil IPS, Additional Commissioner of Police, Sri Srinivas Gowda IPS, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Bengaluru Central), special dignitaries who had helped the Institution become a University, and all the staff of SJU and their families.
- Tandav a festival of inclusion, was organised by the School of Social Work in collaboration with the University of North Carolina, Wilmington (UNCW), USA, Growth School, Oracle, and Smileys India. The festival witnessed more than 800 participants, including differently-abled individuals and children across the nation.
- Yuletide celebration for all the staff took place with the blessing of the Christmas crib, carol singing and a Christmas programme followed by a fellowship lunch.
- The 6th edition of Corporate Genesis, a flagship event of the Institution was held by the Public Relation Office.
- The Public Relation Office hosted the 5th edition of Open Heart, which is one of the biggest PR events of the campus. This year Open Heart hosted Shri Krishna Allavaru, Joint Secretary, Indian National Congress.
- The 6th edition of Neerathon'23, the annual run for water conservation, organised by the outreach team, PR office and the Wildlife Awareness and Conservation Club (WACC) of SJU received 1700 participants aged between 5 and 70.
- The annual inter-college gospel fest Exodus was graced by Dr Benny Prasad, a musicianary, a YWAMer and a world record holder of being the fastest person to travel to 245 Countries.

Bembala Outreach Team & Social Extensions

- The outreach team carried out several activities like anti-corruption awareness and cleanliness Drive, traffic awareness and cleanliness drive, slum survey, paper bag making, sticker campaign on stigma around periods, celebration of Child Rights' Day and a visit to the Bosco Mane children to celebrate Children's Day with them.
- The outreach team carried out charitable activities in slums, orphanages, charitable homes, government schools, and St Mary's Convent, which is home to 80 girl children.
- Har Ghar Tiranga was celebrated by Team Bembala in collaboration with Rainbow House and Women's Voice Siddhapura Slum, Bengaluru, to commemorate the 75 years of Indian Independence. The programme comprised flag hoisting and creating awareness of patriotism and Swachh Bharath toward a clean environment for the children of Rainbow House and unprivileged children in slums. Various games were conducted to encourage the children to participate in the event with the distribution of chocolates to the winners.

- The 139th Annual Athletic Meet was held on campus. The national hockey champion Mr Charles D'Souza was the chief guest.



7.1. INSTITUTIONAL ACHIEVEMENTS



Whereas, the Government has referred the same to the Karnataka State Higher Education Council to inspect the Institution about its infrastructure etc., and submit its report to Government.

Whereas, the Karnataka State Higher Education Council has submitted its report. Based on the report of the Committee, Government has prepared draft THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY Bill and placed it before the Karnataka Legislature for its approval. After obtaining the approval of the Legislature and assent of Hon'ble Governor of Karnataka, THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021 was published in the Official Gazette dated: 16.04.2021 and it was given effect from 2nd July 2022 as published in the Official Gazette.

Whereas, as per Section 3 of THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021 Centre for The Bangaloru Jesuit Educational Society (Regd), Bangalore, has submitted the proposal to Government for establishment of the THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY. Accordingly, Government of Karnataka has constituted a Committee vide its order No. ED/117/URC/2021, dated: 21-02-2022 to inspect the physical infrastructure available with The Bangaloru Jesuit Educational Society (Regd), Bangalore, and to submit its report in terms of Section 3(3) of the said Act.

Whereas, the Committee constituted for the purpose, visited the campus at No: 36, Lalbagh Road, Bengaluru of THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY on 19th April 2022 and after due inspection submitted its report to Government on the issues as contained in Clauses (i) to (xiii) of Section 3(3) the THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021.

Whereas, The Bangaloru Jesuit Educational Society (Regd), Bangalore, has created Statutory Fund of Rs.25.00 crores as stipulated under Section 4 read with proviso to Section 50 of the THE ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021.

- 14. The directions of the Visitor to the University i.e. the H.E the Governor of Karnataka shall be complied by the University as and when they are issued.
- All the statutory bodies and statutory functions are to be complied by the University well in time as per Act.
- The periodical statutory reports shall be submitted to Government as per provisions of the Act.
- 17. The University shall prepare annual accounts as per section 56 of the Act and also the audit of the University shall be taken up as per sub section 2 of 56 of the Act.
- The University shall place the annual accounts and audit reports before the Board of Governors before 30th November every year.
- 19. The Board of Governors shall send the annual accounts alongwith the annual reports and audit reports before 31st December every year to the Government.



With reference to your letter No.SJU/VC/LETSUGC/008/2022-23 dated 06.09.2022 on the above subject. I am directed to inform you that the UGC has received the St. Joseph's University Act, 2021 (Karnataka Act No. 24 of 2021) of the State Legislature of Karnataka wherein St. Joseph's University, P.O.Box 27094, #36, Lalbagh Road, Bengaluru- 560027, Karnataka has been established with effect from 02.07.2022 (Notification No. ED/117/URC/2021 dated 02.07.2022) as a Private University. In view of the establishment of the St. Joseph's University, P.O.Box 27094, #36, Lalbagh Road, Bengaluru- 560027, Karnataka by State Act, the name of the University has been included in the list of Universities established as per section 2(f) of UGC Act. 1956 as maintained by the UGC on its website www.ugc.ac.in.

- 1. The inclusion of the name of the University in the list of Universities maintained by the UGC does not by itself allow the University to make admissions in its programmes. This may be done only after creation of required academic and physical infrastructure facilities, including library, laboratories and appointment of teaching and supporting staff as per the norms and standards laid down by the UGC and Statutory Council(s) concerned.
- 2. The University is now requested to submit detailed information in the enclosed format (Annexure-I)(soft copy as well as hard copy) along with supporting documents duly attested by the Registrar of the University within a period of 3 months from the receipt of this letter. This format along with appendices is also available on the UGC website www.ugc.ac.in. The University is also requested to upload this filled in format and appendices on its website by giving a link on the home page so that the information is accessible to the students and genera; public.



- After receipt of the Information in the above mentioned format, the following procedure would be adopted by the UGC for inspection of the University:-
 - (a) The information received from the University in the prescribed format would be posted on the UGC website within 10 days of the receipt of the information (Annexure-I). Comments would be invited from the general public within 1 month thereafter about the information submitted by the University. The comments received from the general public would be placed before the visiting UGC Expert Committee for perusal.
 - (b) An Expert Committee would be constituted by the UGC to ascertain whether the University fulfils the criteria in terms of programmes, faculty, infrastructural facilities, financial viability, etc. as aid down from time to time by the UGC and other concerned statutory bodies such as AICTE, BCI, NMC, DCI, INC, NCTE, PCI, etc.
 - (c) The UGC Expert Committee would visit the University within 3 months of the receipt of the information (Annexure-I) for on the spot assessment of infrastructure and other facilities available with the University. The report submitted by the UGC Expert Committee would be sent to the University within 2 weeks of the completion of the visit for comments.
 - (d) The University may respond to the report within a period of two weeks after its receipt. In case no comments are received from the University within the timeframe, it would be presumed that the University has no comments to offer and further action would be taken on the report. After receipt of comments from the University, the report and comments received from the University, if any, would be placed before a Standing Committee of the UGC. The recommendations of the Standing Committee would be then placed before the Commission for consideration.
 - (e) The Commission shall take final decision in the matter. It may require the University to submit further compliance report in respect of the observations/suggestions of the UGC Expert Committee/Standing Committee. The compliance report submitted by the University shall be placed before the Commission for consideration.
 - (f) On approval of the Commission, aletter would be issued by the UGC to the effect that the University fulfills the criteria in terms of programmes, faculty, infrastructural facilities, financial viability, etc. as laid down from time to time by the UGC and other concerned statutory bodies.
 - (g) If it is found that the Private University has, even after getting an opportunity to do so, failed to comply with the provisions of the various UGC Regulations including UGC (Establishment of and maintenance of standards in Private Universities) Regulations, 2003 and suggestions given by the UGC Expert Committee, the Commission may pass an order prohibiting the University from offering any course for the award of the degree and/or the post-graduate degree/diploma, as the case may be, till the deficiency is rectified.
 - (h) The UGC may also take necessary action against a University awarding a first degree and /or a post-graduate degree, which are not specified by the UGC and inform the public in general through a public notification.
 - 4. As per the judgment of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the case of Prof. YashpalVs.State of Chhattisgarh, there is no provision to have Regional Centres/off-campus centres beyond the territorial jurisdiction of the State. In view of the judgement of Hon'ble apex court, the University is requested to adhere to the following:
 - a) No off-campus centre(s) is opened by the University outside the territorial jurisdiction of the State in view of the judgement of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in case of Prof. Yashpal vs. State of Chhattisgarh.



- b) In case the University has already started any off campus centre outside the State, it must be closed down immediately. It may also be ensured that any off campus centre within the State shall be opened only as per the provision laid down in the UGC (Establishment of and maintenance of standards in Private Universities) Regulations, 2003 and with the prior approval of UGC.
- c) The University shall not have any affiliated Colleges.
- d) The University must ensure that there is no franchising of higher education even for the purpose of distance education.
- e) The University has to follow UGC (Minimum standards and procedure for award of M.Phil/Ph.D. degree) Regulations, 2016, as amended from time to time.
- 5. No Open and Distance Learning programmes and on- ine programmes shall be started without the prior recognition of UGC. Relevant UGC Regulations are available on the UGC website www.ugc.ac.in
- 6. The University is required to follow the UGC (Establishment of and Maintenance of Standards in Private Universities) Regulation, 2003 and other Regulations issued from time to time and posted on UGC website www.ugc.ac.in.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

ACT 24 OF 2021.- The Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES), has come forward to establish a public private partnership University of unitary nature aided by State and Central Government in the State. The establishment of a public private partnership University by a well known organization will certainly help in spreading the quality education to the needy students. This also accelerates the enhancement of gross enrolment ratio in higher education sector.

It is considered necessary to provide for establishment of a public private partnership University of unitary nature in the name of The St. Joseph's University by the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES).

This public private partnership University focuses on to promote and undertake the advancement of applied university in Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Science, Engineering, and Technology, Management, Education, Religious Studies, Philosophy, Languages and allied sectors and foster industry and market relevant studies, research and innovation as well as emerging areas and to avail better scope and opportunities to serve the society and the nation and for the matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

Accordingly, it becomes imperative to enact a new legislation for the establishment and incorporation of a University of unitary nature in public private partnership University by the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES),

Hence, the Bill.

(First Published in the Karnataka Gazette Extra-ordinary on the Sixteenth day of April 2021)

ST. JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021

(Received the assent of the Governor on the Fifteenth day of April 2021)

An Act to establish the St. Joseph's University, a public private partnership University of unitary in nature aided by State and central Government in the State of Karnataka.

Whereas the Ministry of human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India has approved the establishment of the said University by the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES) in a accordance with the guidelines provided under Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) 2.0 under component-1 upgradation of Autonomous College in to a University.

And whereas it is expedient to establish the said University of Unitary in nature to enable it to function more efficiently as a Centre of excellence for studies, research, skill development innovation through continuing Education and knowledge incubation from studies in undergraduate, leading up to post-graduate, Doctoral and postdoctoral studies in undergraduate, leading up to post-graduate, Doctoral and postdoctoral studies in the field of Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Science, Engineering and Technology, Management, Education, Religious Studies, Philosophy, Languages and allied sectors and foster industry and market relevant studies, research and innovation as well as emerging areas and to avail better scope and opportunities to serve the society and the nation for the purposes herein after appearing;

Be it enacted by the Karnataka State Legislature in the Seventy second year of the Republic of India as follows:-

CHAPTER-I PRELIMINARY

- 1. Short title, extent and commencement.— (1) This Act may be called the St. Joseph's University Act, 2021.
 - (2) It extends to the whole of the State of Karnataka.
- (3) It shall come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification, in the official Gazette, appoint.
 - 2. Definitions.- In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,-
 - (1)"Academic Council" "Board of Governors," "Board of Management" and "Finance Committee" mean, respectively, the Academic Council, Board of Governors, Board of Management and Finance Committee of the University as specified in this Act;
 - (2) "Agenda Matters" means all the matters and business Specified in the Statutes, each of which can be either included in the Agenda or be taken up for discussion and decision at a meeting of the Board of Governors or the Board of Management or any Committees, as the case may be subject to the prior

- written approval of the Chancellor, consenting to the passing of such matters and business at such a meeting;
- (3) "Board of Governors" means the Board of Governors of the University as specified under section 25 of the Act;
- (4) "Board of Management" means the Board of Management of the University as specified under section 26 of the Act;
- (5) "Campus" means a campus established, maintained by the University, situated within the State;
- (6) "Chancellor", "Pro-Chancellor", "Vice-Chancellor" "Pro vice Chancellor" and "Finance Officer," means respectively, the Chancellor, pro- Chancellor, and Vice-Chancellor, pro vice -Chancellor and Finance Officer of the University;
- (7) "Committees" means the committees formed under this Act or by the various functionaries of the University as the case may be, and includes the Search Committee, Nomination Committee, Finance Committee and such other committees;
- (8) "Constituent College" means a college or institution established and maintained by the University;
- (9) "Contract" Means an agreement entered in to in writing between the University through the Registrar and an individual organization through its authorized person;
- (10) "Convocation" means the Convocation of the University, where Degrees, Honorary Degrees, Diplomas, Academic Distinctions, Titles and Certificates, including titles of Honoris Causa are awarded as per the requirements of the University;
- (11) "Government" means the Government of Karnataka;
- (12) "Higher Education" means the study of curriculum or courses for the pursuit of Knowledge beyond 10+2 level;
- (13) "Karnataka State Higher Education Council (KSHEC)" means the Karnataka State Higher Education Council constituted under section 3 of the Karnataka Higher Education Council Act, 2010 (Karnataka Act 26 of 2010);
- (14) "Main Campus" means the main campus established and maintained by the University as its headquarters, wherein its major facilities, faculty, staff, students and academic departments are located;
- (15) "National Accreditation or Regulatory Bodies" means a body established by the Central Government for laying down norms and conditions for ensuring academic standards of higher education, in their designated areas of coverage, including University Grants Commission (UGC), All India Council of Technical Education (AICTE), Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), Indian Council for Social Sciences Research, National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), National Board of Accreditation (NBA), National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), Distance Education Council, Council of Architecture Rehabilitation Council of India and such other Statutory Bodies as may be established or incorporated by the Central Government for the purpose of regulating higher education and by the State Government;
- (16) "Off Campus Centre" means a Centre established and maintained by the University outside its main campus as an additional campus anywhere in the

- State as approved by the Government and UGC where in its complements facilities, faculty, Staff, students and its academic departments are located;
- (17) "Outreach Activity" means an extension activity in the services of the University at large and as specified by the statutes, the rules made by the Government and UGC;
- (18) "Prescribed" means prescribed by rules made by the Government under this Act;
- (19) "Principal in relation to a Constituent College" means the Head of the Constituent College and includes, where there is no Principal or in the absence of the Principal appointed, the Vice-Principal or any other person for the time being appointed to act as Principal of the Constituent College;
- (20) "Public-Private partnership University" means the University partially funded by the State and Central Government and administered by the Sponsoring Body;
- (21) "Registrar" means the Registrar of the University;
- (22) "Regional Centre" means a centre established or maintained by the University for the purpose of co-ordinating and supervising the work of Study Centres in any region and for performing such other functions as may be conferred on such centre by the Board of Management;
- (23) "Society" means the Bangalore Jesuit Education Society (BJES) registered under the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 (Karnataka Act 17 of 1960);
- (24) "Sponsoring Authority" or "Sponsoring Body" in relation to this Act means the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES), registered under the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 (Karnataka Act 17 of 1960);
- (25) "State" means the State of Karnataka;
- (26) "Statutes" or "Regulation" means respectively, the Statutes and Regulations of the University made under this Act;
- (27) "Student" means a student of the University and includes any person enrolled in the University for pursuing any course of study for a degree, Diploma or any other academic distinction duly instituted by the University, including a research degree;
- (28) "Study Center" means a center established and maintained by the University for the purpose of advising, counseling of for rendering any other assistance required by the Students in the context of education;
- (29) "Teacher" means and includes a professor, Associate professor, Assistant professor and such other person as may be appointed for imparting instruction of conducting or guiding research in the University of in a Constituent College and includes the Principal in conformity with the norms specified by the UGC;
- (30) "University" means St. Joseph's University, established and incorporated under this Act by upgrading St, Joseph's College (Autonomous), Bengaluru, under the provisions of RUSA 2.0 and as a public-private- partnership Unitary University;

- (31) "University Grants Commission" (UGC)" means the Commission established under section 4 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (Central Act 3 of 1956); and
- (32) "Visitor" means the visitor of the University as specified in section 13 and the Pro-Visitor of the University as specified in section 14 of this Act.

CHAPTER-II

THE UNIVERSITY AND SPONSORING BODY

- **3. Proposal for the establishment of the University.** (1) The Sponsoring Body shall have the right to establish public-private partnership University, a non affiliating Unitary University, in accordance with the provisions of this Act.
- (2) The proposal to establish a University shall be made to the State Government by the Sponsoring Body.
 - (3) The proposal shall contain the following particulars, namely:-
 - (i) the objects of the University along with the details of the Society;
 - (ii) the extent and status of the University and the availability of land:
 - (iii) the nature and type of programmers of study and research to be undertaken by the University during a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date;
 - (iv) the nature of faculties, courses of study and research proposed to be started;
 - (v) the campus development such as buildings, equipment and structural amenities; :
 - (vi) the phased outlays of capital expenditure for a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date;
 - (vii) the item-wise recurring expenditure, sources of finance and estimated expenditure for each student; .
 - (viii) the scheme for mobilizing resources and the cost of capital thereto and the manner of repayments to each source;
 - (ix) the scheme of generation of funds internally through the recovery of fee from students, revenues anticipated from consultancy and other activities relating to the objects of the University and other anticipated incomes;
 - (x) the details of expenditure on unit cost, the extent of concessions or rebates in fee, freeship and scholarship for students belonging to economically weaker sections and the fee structure indicating varying rate of fee, if any, that would be levied on students who are either non resident Indians or persons of Indian origin or sponsored by non resident Indians or person of Indian origin and students of nationalities other than India.
 - (xi) the years of experience and expertise in the concerned discipline at the command of the Society; as well as the financial resources;
 - (xii) the system for selection of students to the courses of study at the University; and

- (xiii) status of fulfillment of such other conditions as may be required by the State Government to be fulfilled before the establishment of the University.
- **4. Establishment of the University.** (1) After the enactment, the Government, may direct the Sponsoring Body through an order in the form of a letter of Intent to establish a Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund as specified in the Act.
- (2) After the establishment of the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, the Sponsoring Body shall convey its readiness to the Government for starting the activities of the University within a period of one year.
- (3) Upon receiving the letter from the Sponsoring Body confirming its readiness under section 3 and sub-sections (1) and (2), the Government shall constitute a verification Committee consisting of the following members;
 - (i) The Additional Chief Secretary of Higher Education as the Chairperson;
 - (ii) Two ex-officio members representing the Government on the Karnataka State Higher Education Council of their nominees as members;
 - (iii) Two senior academicians in the relevant discipline not below the rank of serving of former Vice-Chancellors as members; and
 - (iv) Executive Director of the Karnataka State Higher Education Council as Member Secretary.
- (4) the Committee shall verify the preparedness of the Sponsoring Body to Commence the academic programs or courses as per the norms and standards specified by UGC or Regulatory Authorities of relevant disciplines and after holding such inquiry as it may deem necessary, submit its Report. After considering the Report of the Verification Committee, the Government may, by notification, accord sanction for the establishment of public-private- partnership University of Unitary in nature in the State by the name of "St. Joseph's University."
- (5) The headquarters of the University shall be at its main campus at Bengaluru. The University may have its off-Campus, Centres or Institutions anywhere in the State after five years of establishment with the prior permission of the Government and UGC norms.
- (6) The First Chancellor, the First Pro-Chancellor, the First Vice- Chancellor, the First Registrar, the First Controller of Examinations, the First Finance Officer, the members of the Board of Governors, First members of the Board of Governors, the members of the Board of Management and the Academic Council and all persons who may hereafter become such officers or members, so long as they continue to hold such office or membership, shall constitute a body corporate and can sue and be sued in the name of the University.
- (7) On sanction for the establishment of the University under sub-section (4), the land and other movable and immovable properties acquired, created, arranged or built by the Sponsoring Body for the purpose of the University shall vest in or with the University.
- (8) In all suits and other legal proceedings by or against the University, the pleading shall be signed and verified by and all processes in such suits and proceedings shall be issued to and be served on the Registrar.
- (9) The land, building and other properties of the University shall not be used for any purpose other than incidental to the objects of the University.

- **5. Grants and Financial Assistance**.- (1) The University may be financed by the State and Central Government.
- (2) Subject to availability of funds on release of Government of India share of 60 percent such grant will be released and the State Government may contribute 40 percent of its share allotted for Component-1 of RUSA 2.0 to support existing teaching and non-teaching posts through salary grants in the aided courses in accordance with the requirements of RUSA Scheme of the Ministry of Human Resource Development. No State Government grant in aid shall be granted to any post of the University establishment.
- (3) The University shall be entitled to receive grants under RUSA from Ministry of Human Resource Development and the State Government and from any other body or corporation owned or controlled by the State or Centre or from private organizations, companies, institutions, etc and through philanthropy of otherwise;
- (4) The service conditions and salary, pension, gratuity and other grants received in respect of the aided staff, both teaching and non-teaching of St. Joseph's Collage (Autonomous), Bengaluru, and Constituent Colleges of the University may be protected and continued to be provided by the State Government as a Constituent College.
- (5) The University may obtain or accept funds from funding agencies under various schemes of the Central Government and State Government or otherwise:-
 - (a) For Research and Development and other activities; or
 - (b) For any Specific research or programs receiving support from the Government:

Provided that, the University may receive financial support from any other legal source.

- **6. Power to establish constituent Colleges and off-campus Centres.** The University may have Constituent Colleges, Regional Centres, additional campuses, Study Centres and Off-campus Centres or Institutions at such places in the State as it deems fit after the completion of five years after its establishment with prior approval of the State Government and subject to norms of UGC and other National Accreditation or Regulatory bodies.
- **7. Objects of the University.** The objects of University shall be to create, organize, preserve and disseminate knowledge in one or more fields for advancement of the student community in particular and human kind in general and the University shall employ a broad range of strategies to achieve its vision including pursuing ethics and values with the following objectives,-
 - (i) to provide instruction, teaching, training, consultancy, research and development in relevant disciplines of higher education and make provision of research, innovation, advancement and dissemination of knowledge in these disciplines and such other objects as the sponsoring Body may deem fit with the prior approval of the Government;
 - (ii) to design and deliver high quality training, capacity building and development system for teachers, professionals and administrators in education and other systems;
 - (iii) to develop resource centers and to contribute to high quality in education;

- (iv) to institute degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions like award of credits on the basis of successful completion of academic work evaluated through modern methods of assessment;
- (v) to collaborate with any other universities, research institutions, non-profit organizations, industry associations, professional associations or other organizations, offer specific education and research programs, training programs and exchange programs for students, faculty members and others;
- (vi) to disseminate knowledge and develop a public debate on issues of higher education and allied development fields through seminars, conferences, executive education programs, community development programs, publications and training programs and events;.
- (vii) to undertake programs for development and training of faculty and researchers of the University in partnership with any other institutions of quality:
- (viii) to undertake inter and inter-disciplinary collaborative research in cooperation with any other organization;
- (ix) to undertake necessary or expedient action to pursue and promote the objectives of the University; and
- (x) to undertake any objectives as may be recommended by the Government for the enhancement of higher education and other development sectors in India.
- **8. Powers and functions of the University.** The University shall have the following powers, and functions, namely:-
- (1) to establish and maintain Campuses, Regional Centres and Study Centres in the State as may be determined by the University from time to time in the manner laid down by the Statutes with prior approval of the Government and the UGC as per UGC norms, standards and regulations;
- (2) to carry out all such other activities as may be necessary or feasible in furtherance of the object of the University,
- (3) to confer degrees or other academic distinctions in the manner and under conditions laid down in the Statutes;
- (4) to institute and award fellowships, scholarships and prizes, medals etc., in accordance with the Statutes;
- (5) to demand and receive such fees bills, invoices and legally permissible and collect charges as may be fixed by the Statutes or rules, as the case may be;
- (6) to make provisions for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for students and employees, as the case may be;
- (7) to make appointments of Faculty, officers and employees of the University or a Constituent College, Campuses, Regional Centres, Study Centres and Off-Campus Centers;
- (8) to receive voluntary donations and gifts of any kind not prohibited by any Law for the time being in force and to acquire, hold, manage, maintain and dispose of any movable or immovable property, including Trust and Endowment properties for the purpose of the University or a Constituent College or a Campus, Regional Centres and Study Centres;

- (9) to institute and maintain hostels and to recognize places of residence for students of the University or a Constituent College or Off-Campus Centers;
- (10) to supervise and control the residences and to regulate the discipline among the students and all categories of employees and to lay down the conditions of service of such employees, including the Code of Conduct for students and employees;
- (11) to create academic, administrative and support staff and other necessary posts;
- (12) to co-operate and collaborate with other Universities in such a manner and for such purposes as the University may determine from time to time;
- (13) to organize and conduct refresher courses, orientation courses, workshops, seminars and other programs for teachers, evaluators and other academic staff;
- (14) to determine standards of admission to the University or a Constituent College, with the approval of Academic Council and to make admission of students of Karnataka not less than the extent provided for in this Act;
- (15) to do all such other acts or things whether incidental to the powers aforesaid or not, as may be necessary to further the objects of the University;
- (16) to institute Degrees, Diplomas, Certificates and other academic distinctions on the basis of examination or any other method of evaluation approved by the Government:
- (17) to provide for the preparation of instructional materials in electronic and print media;
- (18) to raise, collect, subscribe and borrow money with the approval of the Board of Governors whether on the security of the property of the University, for the purposes of the University;
- (19) to acquire and takeover and manage any other educational institutions with the prior approval of the Government:
 - (20) to acquire properties with the prior approval of the Sponsoring Body; and
- (21) to undertake any other activities connected with or incidental to above objectives of the University.
 - **9.** University open to all classes, Castes, creed, gender or nation.- (1) The University shall be open to all persons of any gender and of whatever race, creed, caste, class or nation.
- (2) The University admissions shall be made on the basis of merit in the qualifying examinations:

Provided that, sixty percent in all unaided courses or programs and 90 percent of admission in all aided courses and programs of the admissions in all courses or programs of the university shall be reserved for the students of Karnataka and admissions for professional courses shall be made through a Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government or its agency and seats shall be allotted as per the merit and reservation policy of the State Government from time to time:

Provided further that, where there are less than ten seats in any courses or programme like Post Graduate, they shall be reserved by clubbing such courses, programs together and where there are less than three seats in any course or programme, they shall be reserved by rotation.

Provided also that, if the University is recognized as a Minority Institution the admissions shall be made according to the law applicable to Minority Institutions.

- 10. National Accreditation.- The University shall seek accreditation from respective statutory national accreditation bodies after its establishment. Further all the courses or programs of study conducted shall fulfill all requirements as per the regulations of relevant National Accreditation or Regulatory Bodies.
- **11. Powers of the Sponsoring Body.** The Sponsoring Body shall have the following powers with reference to the University, each of which may be exercised by the Sponsoring Body as provided for in this Act, namely:-
 - (i) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Chancellor;
 - (ii) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Pro-Chancellor;
 - (iii) to constitute the first Board of Governors;
 - (iv) to nominate the first chairperson of the Board of Governors;
 - (v) to nominate three persons of whom one shall be a woman and one shall be an external to the Body;
 - (vi) to nominate two persons as members of the Board of Management;
 - (vii) to determine the source of funds to be contributed to the University Endowment Fund;
 - (viii) to determine the application and spending of moneys by the University;
 and
 - (ix) to resolve any conflict at the meeting of the Board of Governors in the manner provided for in this Act.

CHAPTER - III

OFFICERS OF THE UNIVERSITY

- **12. Officers of the University**. The following shall be the officers of the University, namely: -
 - (i) The Visitor;
 - (ii) The Pro-visitor;
 - (iii) The Chancellor:
 - (iv) The Pro-Chancellor;
 - (v) The Vice-Chancellor;
 - (vi) The Pro Vice-Chancellor;
 - (vii) The Dean/Director of School;
 - (viii) The Registrar;
 - (ix) Controller of Examinations;
 - (x) The Finance Officer; and
 - (xi) Such other officers as may be declared by the Statutes to be officers of the University.

- **13. The Visitor.** (1) His Excellency the Governor of Karnataka shall be the Visitor of the University and the Visitor may offer suggestions for the improvement of the functioning of the University.
 - (2) The Visitor shall preside over the convocation;
 - (3) The Visitor shall have the following powers, namely:-
 - to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University;
 - (ii) on the basis of the information received by the Visitor and being satisfied that any order, proceeding or decision taken by any Authority of the University is not in conformity with the Act, Regulations or Rules, the Visitor may issue such directions as deemed fit in the interest of the University, and
 - (iii) the directions so issued shall be complied with by all concerned.
- **14. The Pro-Visitor.** (1) The Honourable Minister for Higher Education of the Government of Karnataka shall be the Pro-Visitor of the University.
- (2) The Pro-Visitor shall, when the Visitor is absent, preside over the Convocation.
 - (3) The Pro-Visitor shall have the following powers, namely:
 - (a) to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University;
- (b) to call a meeting of the Authorities of the Sponsoring Body/University relating to the affairs of the University; and
- (c) on the basis of the information received by the Pro-Visitor, he may issue such directions as deemed fit in the interest of the University.
- **15. The Chancellor.** (1) The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body.
- (2) The current Chairperson of the Sponsoring Body shall be the first Chancellor of the University, whose term shall be as decided by the Sponsoring Body.
- (3) The subsequent Chancellor shall be either a member of the Sponsoring Body or such other person of eminence or national figure in the field of Higher Education as may be decided by the Sponsoring Body.
- (4) The subsequent Chancellor so appointed shall hold the office as determined by the Sponsoring Body.
- (5) The Chancellor shall have such powers as may be conferred on him by this Act or the Statutes made there under, which may include the following powers; namely;-
 - (i) to function as the Head of the University;
 - to preside over all the Convocations of the University in the absence of the Visitor and Pro-Visitor;
 - (iii) to function as the Chairperson of the Board of Governors;
 - (iv) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the Statutes;

- (v) to nominate a person as a member of the Nomination Committee as per this Act;
- (vi) to appoint the Registrar and the Finance Officer;
- (vii) to nominate two academicians as members on the Board of Governors;
- (viii) to approve the appointment of Pro Vice-Chancellor(s);
- (ix) to constitute the first Board of Management, the Academic Council, the Finance Committee and other Committees;
- to pre-approve the Agenda matters in the Board of Governors in the manner provided for in the Act; and
- (xi) to resolve a conflict (excluding conflicts at a meeting of the Board of Governors) and in the manner provided for in this Act;
- (6) In the event of there being a conflict inter-se between the functionary or Body and any other functionary or Body of the University, then the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.
- 16. The Pro-Chancellor.- (1) The Pro-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body, on such terms and conditions as may be laid down in the statutes. The Pro-Chancellor shall assist the Chancellor in all such matters required by the Chancellor. The role and responsibilities or Pro-Chancellor shall be as laid down by Statutes.
- (2) The Pro-Chancellor shall preside over the Convocation in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor and Chancellor.
- (3) The Pro-Chancellor shall chair all the Committees, meetings and convocations in the absence of the Chancellor.
- (4) The services of the Pro-Chancellor may be terminated by the Chancellor at any point of time as he deems fit.
- 17. The Vice-Chancellor.- (1) The Vice- Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor for a term of four years subject to other terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes from among three persons recommended by the Search Committee constituted in accordance with the provisions of this Act. After the term of four years, the incumbent Vice-Chancellor shall be eligible for another term of four years:

Provided that the Vice-chancellor shall continue to hold the office even after expiry of his term till the new Vice-chancellor joins. However, in any case this period shall not exceed one year.

- (2) The Search Committee referred to in sub-section (1) shall consist of the following persons, namely:- Three nominees of the Board of Governors with one of them being the Government Nominee and the other two being senior or distinguished academicians, of whom one shall be a woman. Out of the three nominees of the Board of Governors, one shall be appointed as the Chairperson of the Committee by the Chancellor.
- (3) The Search Committee shall, on the basis of merit, recommend three persons with the highest level of competence, integrity, morals, and institutional commitment besides being a distinguished academician with a minimum of ten years of experience as a Professor in a University system or ten years of experience in an equivalent position in reputed research or academic administrative organization.

(4) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the Principal Executive and Academic Officer of the University and shall exercise general supervision and control over the affairs of the University and give effect to the decisions of the authorities of the University:

Provided that, where any matter, other than the appointment of a teacher is of urgent nature requiring immediate action and the same could not be immediately dealt with by any officer or the authority or other body of the University empowered by or under this Act to deal with it, the Vice-Chancellor may take such action as he may deem fit with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.

(5) The Vice-Chancellor shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be laid down by the Statutes, Regulations or the Rules:

Provided that, where in the opinion of the Vice-chancellor, any decision of any authority of the university is outside the powers conferred by this Act or Statutes, Regulations or Rules made there under or is likely to be prejudicial to the interests of the university, he shall request the concerned authority to revise its decision within fifteen days from the date of its decision and in case the authority refuses to revise such decision wholly or partly or fails to take any decision within fifteen days, then such matter shall be referred to the Chancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.

- (6) The services of the Vice-Chancellor can be terminated by the Chancellor with the approval of the Board of Governors after following the principles of natural justice and after providing an opportunity to the Vice-Chancellor to present his case including the termination on disciplinary grounds.
- (7) The Vice-Chancellor shall preside over the Convocation in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor, Chancellor and Pro-Chancellor.
- **18.** The Pro Vice-Chancellor. The Vice- Chancellor shall appoint not exceeding three pro-vice Chancellors with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and the person shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- **19. The Dean or Director.** The Dean or Director shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor in such manner and they shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- **20. The Registrar.-** (1) The Registrar shall be appointed by the Chancellor for a term of three years in such manner and on such terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- (2) All contracts as defined in statutes shall be entered into, and signed by the Registrar on behalf of the University.
- (3) The Registrar shall have the power to authenticate records on behalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may conferred by the Statutes or may be required from time to time, by the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor or the Vice-Chancellor.
- (4) The Registrar shall be responsible for the due custody of the records and the common seal of the University and shall be bound to place before the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor or any other authority, all such information and documents as demanded.
- **21. Controller of Examinations.-** (1) The Controller of Examinations shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor in such manner and on such terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes.

- (2) The Controller of Examinations shall be the principal Officer-in-charge of the conduct of the examinations of the University and declaration of results. He shall be a full-time salaried officer of the University and shall work directly under the Vice-Chancellor.
- (3) The appointment of Controller of Examinations shall be for a term of three years, and he shall be eligible for reappointment for subsequent terms.
- (4) The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible for making all arrangements necessary for holding examinations and declaration of results by formulating the Calendar of Examinations.
- (5) The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible to take necessary steps to avoid malpractices in examination processes and take disciplinary action including legal proceedings in consultation with the Registrar and Vice-Chancellor, wherever needed.
- (6) The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible to review from time to time, the results of University examinations and forward Reports thereon to the Academic Council.
- (7) The Controller of Examinations shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed in the Statutes or assigned by the Vice-Chancellor from time to time.
- **22. The Finance Officer.-** The Finance Officer shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and he shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be specified by the Statutes.
- **23. Other Officers.** The manner of appointment, terms and conditions of service and powers and duties of the other officers of the University shall be such as may be specified by the Statutes.

CHAPTER - IV

AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

- **24. Authorities of the University.-** The following shall be the authorities of the University, namely:-
 - (i) The Board of Governors;
 - (ii) The Board of Managements;
 - (iii) The Academic Council;
 - (iv) The Finance Committee;
 - (v) The Research and Innovation Council;
 - (vi) The Faculties / Schools, and
 - (vii) Such other authorities as may be declared by the Statutes to be the Authorities of the University.
- **25.** The Board of Governors and its powers.- (1) The Board of Governors shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - (i) The Chancellor Chairperson;
 - (ii) The Pro-Chancellor Member;
 - (iii) The Vice-Chancellor Member;

- (iv) The Principal Secretary to the Government in the Higher Education
 Department or his nominee not below the rank of a Deputy Secretary
 - Ex-officio Member;
- (v) The Principal Secretary to the Government in any other relevant
 Department or his nominee not below the rank of a Deputy Secretary
 Member;
- (vi) One expert from the field of management, finance or any other specialized area, including administration to be nominated by the Government - Member;
- (vii) Three persons nominated by the Sponsoring Body of whom one shall be a woman and one shall be external to the Body Members;
- (viii) Two academicians nominated by the Chancellor Member;
- (ix) One Pro Vice-Chancellor to be nominated by the Chancellor on rotation, based on seniority for a two-year term, who shall be a non-voting member; and
- (x) One eminent academician as nominee of the UGC Member.
- (2) The Registrar shall be the Secretary of the Board of Governors with no voting powers.
- (3) The tenure of office of the members of the Board of Governors, appointment of members, other than Government nominees, their renewal and removal, etc., shall be such as may be laid down by the Statutes.
- (4) All meetings of the Board of Governors shall be chaired by the Chancellor and in his absence by the Pro-Chancellor or in the absence of either of them by any member of the Board as nominated by the Chancellor. If the Chancellor has not nominated any person to Chair such a meeting, members present in the meeting shall elect the Chairperson for that meeting only from among themselves by a simple majority.
- (5) Quorum for all the meetings of the Board of Governors shall be five members attending and voting at such a meeting:

Provided that, the presence of either the Chancellor or one nominee of the Sponsoring Body and in the absence of the Chancellor or one nominee of Sponsoring Body, the Vice - Chancellor, shall always be necessary to form the quorum for any meeting of the Board of Governors.

- (6) The Board of Governors shall be the Principal Governing Body of the University and shall have the following powers, namely:-
 - (i) to appoint the Statutory Auditors of the University;
 - (ii) to lay down academic / other policies to be pursued by the University;
 - (iii) to review decisions of the other authorities of the University if they are not in conformity with the provisions of this Act, or the Statutes, or the Regulation or the Rules;
 - (iv) to approve the Budget, Annual Accounts and Annual Report of the University;

- (v) to make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the earlier Statutes and Rules;
- (vi) to take decision about voluntary winding up of the University;
- (vii) to approve proposals for submission to the Government;
- (viii) to take such decisions and steps as are found desirable for effectively carrying out the objects of the University.
- (7) The Board of Governor shall meet at least two times a year.
- (8) The Board of Governors shall meet at such time and place as may be specified by the Statutes.
- **26. The Board of Management.-**(1) The Board of Management shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - (i) The Vice Chancellor as the chairperson, with the members being;
 - (ii) The Pro-Vice Chancellor;
 - (iii) The Registrar-Member-Secretary;
 - (iv) Two nominees of the Sponsoring Body with at least one of them being eternal to the Body;
 - (v) Two Deans or Directors as nominated by the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (vi) One Principal of Constituent College to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor by rotation based on seniority for a three-year term.
- (2) The powers and functions of the Board of Management shall be such as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
- (3) All meetings of the Board of Management shall be chaired by the Vice Chancellor and in the absence of the Vice Chancellor the meeting shall be chaired by the nominee of the Sponsoring Body. In case the Sponsoring Body has not nominated any person, then the meeting shall be chaired by the Pro-Vice-Chancellor. In the absence of any of these, the meeting shall be chaired by any other member as elected by the members present in the meeting;
- (4) In the event of a conflict of opinion in arriving at a decision in the Board of Management, the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor shall be final.
 - (5) The Board of Management shall meet at least four times in a year.
- (6) The quorum for every meeting of the Board of Management shall be one third of the membership of the Board.
- **27. The Academic Council.** (1) The Academic Council shall consist of the following, namely: -
 - (i) The Vice-Chancellor as the Chairperson;
 - (ii) The Pro-Vice-Chancellor Member;
 - (iii) The Registrar Member-Secretary;
 - (iv) The Controller of Examinations Member;
 - (v) One Nominee of the Board of Governors Member;
 - (vi) One Nominee of the Board of Management Member;
 - (vii) The Dean or Director Member; and

- (viii) Such other members as may be specified by the Statutes.
- (2) The Academic Council shall be the Principal Academic Body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University.
- (3) The powers, duties and functions of the Academic Council shall be as prescribed by the Statutes.
 - (4) The Academic Council shall meet at least two times in a year.
- (5) The quorum for every meeting of the Academic Council shall be one third of the membership of the Council.
- **28. The Finance Committee.-** (1) The Finance Committee shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - (i) The Chancellor or his nominee Chairperson
 - (ii) The Vice-Chancellor Member
 - (iii) The Registrar Member
 - (iv) The Finance Officer Secretary
 - (v) One nominee of the Sponsoring Body Member
 - (vi) One nominee of the Chancellor with expertise in Banking, Finance or Accountancy – Member, and
 - (vii) Such other members as may be specified by the Statutes.
- (2) The Finance Committee shall be the Principal Financial Body of the University to take up financial matters and shall subject to the provisions of this Act, Statutes and Rules undertake coordination and exercise general supervision over the financial matters of the University.
 - (3) The Finance Committee shall meet at least four times in a year.
- (4) The quorum for every meeting of the Finance Committee shall be one third of the membership of the Council.
- **29.** The Research and Innovation Council.- (1) The Research and Innovation Council shall be the Principal Research Committee of the University and shall provide the larger holistic vision of the kind of research to be undertaken by the University, including prioritization of the research areas. The Research and Innovation Council shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, coordinate and exercise general, supervision over the Innovation and Research policies of the University.
 - (2) The Research and Innovation Council shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - (i) The Vice- Chancellor Chairperson
 - (ii)The Pro Vice-Chancellor Member
 - (iii)The Dean of Research Secretary
 - (iv)Head of the Department of Innovation Member
 - (v)Deans of all Faculties Members and
 - (vi)Such other members as may be specified in the Statutes.

- **30.** The Faculties of Schools.- The Faculties or Schools shall be based on the existing programs like Science, Arts and Commerce to begin with. However, the University shall be free to launch additional Faculties or Schools with the approval of the Board of Governors. The constitution, functions, duties and powers of the Faculties or Schools shall be as prescribed by the Statutes.
- **31. Other Authorities.-** The constitution, powers and functions of the other Authorities of the University shall be such as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
- **32.** Disqualification for membership of an Authority or Body.- A person shall be disqualified for being a member of any of the Authorities or Bodies of the University, if he,-
 - (a) is of unsound mind and stands so declared by a competent court;
 - (b) is an un-discharged insolvent;
 - (c) has been convicted of any offence involving moral turpitude;
 - (d) is conducting or engaging himself in private coaching classes; or
 - (e) has been punished for indulging in or promoting unfair practice in the conduct of any examination, in any form, anywhere;
 - (f) as and when the Sponsoring Body were to form and opinion in writing that a Member of any of the authorities or bodies is unfit to hold the post.
- **33. Proceedings not invalidated on account of vacancy.** No act or proceedings of any authority of the University shall be invalid merely by reason of the existence of any vacancy or defect in the constitution of the Authority.
- **34. Provisions pertaining to Agenda Matters.** (1) No Matter shall be either included in the Agenda for or taken up for discussion or decided in the meeting of the Board of Governors or the Board of Management or the Academic Council or any other Authority or any Committee without obtaining the prior approval of the Chairperson of the Board or Council or Authority or Committee, as the case may be.
- (2) In the event of breach of any provisions of this Act, the Chancellor shall be entitled at all time to immediately take remedial action by reversing all decisions taken by any functionary or Body of the University and consequent upon the pursuit of such a remedial action all such actions taken by the functionary or Body of the University in breach of the provisions of the Act shall be deemed to be null and void, ab initio and consequently status quo ante shall prevail in respect of the matter or decision in breach.

CHAPTER-V STATUTES AND REGULATIONS

- **35. Statutes.-** Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes may provide for all or any matter relating to the University and its staff as given below, namely:-
 - the procedure for transaction of business of the Authorities of the University and the constitution and the composition of Bodies not specified in this Act;
 - (ii) the holding of Convocations to confer Degrees or Diplomas;
 - the terms and conditions of appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, the Registrar and the Finance Officer and their powers and functions;

- (iv) the mode of recruitment and the terms and conditions of service of the other officers, Teachers and employees of the University subject to such rules as may be prescribed by the State Government;
- (v) the procedure for resolving disputes between the University and its officers, Faculty members, employees and students;
- (vi) creation, abolition or restructuring of departments and faculties;
- (vii) the manner of co-operation with other Universities or institutions of higher learning;
- (viii) the procedure for conferment of honorary degrees;
- (ix) provisions regarding grant of free ships and scholarships;
- (x) policies in respect of seats in different courses of studies and the procedure of admission of students to such courses;
- (xi) policy relating to the fee chargeable from students for various courses of studies;
- institution of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, free ships, medals and prizes; and
- (xiii) any other matters which may be decided by the Board of Governors or required to be provided by statutes under this Act.
- **36. Statutes how made.-** (1) The first statutes framed by the Board of Management shall be submitted to the Board of Governors for its approval.
- (2) The Board of Governors shall consider the First Statutes, submitted by the Board of Management and shall give its approval thereon with such modifications, if any, as it may deem necessary.
- (3) The University shall publish the First Statutes, as approved by the Board of Governors in the University Notification and on its website, and thereafter, the statutes shall come into force from the date of its publication. A copy of the First Statutes shall be forwarded to the Karnataka State Higher Education Council and Government for information and record within four weeks of the University notification.
- **37. Power to amend the Statutes.-** The Board of Governors may make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the Statutes.
- **38. Regulations.-** Subject to the provisions of this Act, the regulations may provide for the following matters, namely:-
 - (i) admission of students to the University and their enrolment and continuance as such;
 - the courses of study to be laid down for all degrees and other academic distinctions of the University;
- (iii) the award of degrees and other academic distinctions;
- the conditions of the award of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, medals and prizes;
- (v) the conduct of examinations and the conditions and mode of appointment and duties of examining bodies, examiners invigilators, tabulators and moderators;

- (vi) the fee to be charged for admission to the examinations, degrees and other academic distinctions of the University;
- (vii) the conditions of residence of the students at the University or a Constituent College;
- (viii) maintenance of discipline among the students of the University or a Constituent College; and
- (ix) all other matters as may be provided in the Statutes under the Act.
- **39. Regulations how made.-** The Regulations shall be made by the Academic Council and approved by Board of Management.
- **40. Power to amend Regulations.-** The Academic Council may, with the approval of the Board of Management, make new or additional regulations or amend or repeal the Regulations with the approval of the Board of Management.
- **41. Fixation of fee.-** (1) The fee in respect of ninety percent of the admissions in all aided courses of the university for which admissions are made through a Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government or its agency under the proviso to section 9 shall be the fees, as fixed by the State Government, for Government seats from time to time, in accordance with the consensual agreement entered into by the Government and the University in accordance with the Karnataka Professional Educational Institutions (Regulation of Admission and Determination of Fee) Act, 2006 (Karnataka Act 8 of 2006).
- (2) In respect of other seats of the University, the fee shall be determined by the Fee Regulatory Committee constituted under the chairmanship of a retired Judge of the High Court in accordance with the provisions of section 6 of the Karnataka Professional Educational Institutions (Regulation of Admission and Determination of Fee) Act, 2006 (Karnataka Act 8 of 2006). For the purpose of this section, the University shall be deemed to be the Private Unaided Professional Educational Institution.

CHAPTER - VI MISCELLANEOUS

42. The method and recruitment Conditions of service of employees.- (1) Every employee shall be appointed by an order containing the terms and conditions that may be specified by Statutes and Regulations or prescribed by the State Government if any by rules which shall be kept in the University Office and a copy of which shall be furnished to the employee concerned subject to reservation policy of the State Government:

Provided that, in respect of aided courses teaching staff shall be appointed in accordance with the UGC guidelines and other State guidelines as followed in Government established Universities with prior approval of the State Government. Whereas in case of non-teaching staff, student ratio and staffing pattern prescribed by the Government shall be followed.

- (2) Disciplinary action against the employees shall be governed by the procedure specified in the Statutes.
- (3) Any dispute arising between the University and an employee shall be resolved in the manner provided for in the written contract and in accordance with the Statues.

- **43. Right to appeal.-** In case of disciplinary actions by the University against its employee or student, the aggrieved employee or students shall have a right to appeal to such Authority as prescribed by the statutes.
- **44. Provident or pension fund.-** The University shall constitute for the benefit of its employees such provident or pension fund and provide such insurance scheme as it may deem fit in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be specified by the statutes and the laws in force.
- **45. Disputes as to constitution of University authorities and bodies.-** If any question arises as to whether any person has been duly appointed as or is entitled to be a member of any authority or other body of the University, the matter shall be referred to the Chancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.
- **46. Constitution of Committees.** Any authority of the University mentioned in Section 24 of this Act, shall be empowered to constitute a committee of such Authority, consisting of such members and having powers as the Authority may deem fit.
- **47. Filling of casual vacancies.** Any casual vacancy among the members, other than ex-officio members of any Authority or Body of the University shall be filled in the same manner in which the member whose vacancy is to be filled up, was chosen, and the person filling the vacancy shall be a member of such Authority or body for the residual term for which the person in whose place he would have been a member.
- **48. Protection of action taken in good faith.-** No suit or other legal proceedings shall lie against any officer or other employee of the University for anything, which is done in good faith or intended to be done in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, the Statues or the Regulations or the Rules.
- **49. Transitional provisions.-** (1) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, the First Vice-Chancellor may, with the previous approval of the Chancellor, discharge any of the functions of the University for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act, and for that purpose may exercise any powers or perform any duties which by this Act are to be exercised or performed by any Authority of the University until such Authority comes into existence as provided by this Act.

Further, such of the students who were admitted to the institution or an affiliated college shall continue to complete their course or programme in the college until they qualify to receive their Degree from the Parent University.

50. Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund. (1) The University shall establish a Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund of at least rupees twenty five crores out of which at least fifteen crores shall be in cash and remaining in the form of Bank Guarantee which may be increased suoMoto but shall not be decreased.

- (2) The University shall have power to invest the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund in such manner as may be prescribed by the rules.
- (3) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the Development Fund to the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund except in the event of dissolution of the University, and in no other circumstances can any amount be transferred from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund for any other purposes.
- (4) Seventy five percent of the incomes received from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund shall ordinarily be used for the purpose of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty five percent shall be re-invested in the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.
- **51. University Endowment Fund.-** (1) The University shall establish a Endowment Fund having such funds as may be determined by the Sponsoring Body which can include donations and other funds received from time to time.
- (2) The University shall have the power to invest the University Endowment Fund in a manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
- (3) The University Endowment Fund shall be a self-imposed fund that the University desires to maintain voluntarily and invest it responsibly to protect itself from financial challenges that may arise on account of pursuing social objectives and unforeseen circumstance.
- (4) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the development fund to the University Endowment Fund. Excepting in the case of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances monies, can be transferred from the University Endowment Fund for other purposes.
- (5) Up to eighty percent of the incomes received from the University Endowment Fund may be used for the purposes of development or general work of the University. The remaining income shall be reinvested into the University Endowment Fund.
- **52. General Fund.-** (1) The University shall establish a General Fund to which the following amount shall be credited, namely:-
 - (i)all fees which may be collected by the University;
 - (ii)all sums received from any other source not prohibited by any law for the time being in force;
 - (iii) all contributions made to the University; and
 - (iv)all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force.
- (2) The funds credited to the General Fund shall be applied to meet all the recurring expenditure of the University.
- **53. Development fund.-**(1) The University shall also establish a Development Fund to which the following funds shall be credited, namely:
- (i) development fees which may be charged to and collected from the students;

- all sums received from any other source for the purposes of the development of the University;
- (iii) all contributions made by the University;
- (iv) all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body;
 which are not prohibited by any law for. the time being in force; and
- (v) all incomes received from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.
- (2) The funds credited to the Development Fund from time to time shall be utilized for the development of the University.
- (3) Under no circumstances the funds of the University shall be transferred to other educational institutions of the sponsoring Body.
- **54. Maintenance of funds.-** The funds established under sections 50, 51, 52 and 53 above shall subject to general supervision and control of the Board of Governors, be regulated and maintained in such manner as may be prescribed by the State Government.
- **55. Annual Report.-**(1) The Annual Report of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Board of Management and shall be submitted to the Board of Governors for its approval.
- (2) The Board of Governors shall consider the Annual Report in its meeting and may approve the same with or without modification.
- (3) A copy of the annual report duly approved by the Board of Governors shall be sent to the Visitor and the State Higher Education Council, the Government and the Visitor before the closure of each financial year and to be laid before each House of the State Legislature. The Annual Report may also be uploaded on the University website.
- **56.** Account and Audit.- (1) The annual Accounts and Balance sheet of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Finance Committee and all funds accruing to or received by the University from all source and all amounts disbursed or Paid shall be entered in the account maintained by the University.
- (2) The annual accounts of the University shall be audited by an Auditor, who shall be a member of the Institute of Charted Accountants of India.
- (3) A copy of the Annual accounts and the Balance Sheet together with the Audit Report shall be submitted to the Board of Governors before closure of the financial year.
- (4) The annual Accounts, the Balance Sheet and the Audit Report shall be considered by the Board of Governors at its meeting and the Board of Governors shall forward their copies to the Visitor and the Government and the Karnataka State Higher Education Council along with its observations.
- (5) In the event of any objections and suggestions in the report of the Auditors, the State Government may issue directions to the University to rectify the mistakes and such directions shall be binding on the University.
- **57. Mode of proof of University record.-** A copy of any receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding or resolution of any authority or committee of the University

- (2) If the fund referred to in sections 50, 51, 52 and 53 are not sufficient to meet the expenditure of the University during the taking over period of its management, such expenditure may be met by the Government by disposing of the properties or assets of the University.
- (3) Where the dissolution of the University is due to mismanagement or maladministration, the Government is at liberty to identify the persons responsible for such mismanagement or maladministration and to impose penalty as it deems fit.
- **64. Removal of difficulties.-** (1) If any difficulty arises in giving effect to the provisions of this Act, the Government may, by a notification or by order, make such provisions, which are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as appear to it to be necessary or expedient, for removing the difficulty:

Provided that, no notification or order under this section shall be made after the expiry of a period of five years from the date of commencement of this Act.

- (2) Every Order made under sub- section (1), shall, as soon as may be after it is made, be laid before the State Legislature.
- **65. Power to make rules by the State Government.-** (1) The Government may make rules, by notification, to carry out the purposes of this Act.
- (2) Every rule made under this Act shall be laid as soon as may be after it is made before each House of the State Legislature while it is in session for a total period of thirty days which may be comprised in one session or in two or more successive sessions, and if, before the expiry of the session immediately following the session or the successive sessions aforesaid, both Houses agree in making any modification in the rule or both Houses agree that the rule should not be made, the rule shall thereafter have effect only in such modified form or be of no effect, as the case may be, so however, that any such modification or annulment shall be without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done under that rule.

CHAPTER I

Titles, Definitions and General Conditions

1. Short Title and Commencement

1.1. These Statutes shall be called the First Statutes of ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY as approved by its Board of Governors as prescribed in Section 35 of the St Joseph's University Act, 2021. These Statutes as approved by the Board of Governors of St Joseph's University shall come into force from the date of their notification by the University.

2. Definitions

In these Statutes the following terms shall have the meanings given below.

- 2.1 "Act" means the ST JOSEPH'S UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021; (Karnataka Act No. 24 of 2021).
- 2.2 "Academic Council" means the Academic Council of the University, constituted as per Section 27 of the Act.
- 2.3 "Academic Year" means the period of 12 consecutive months normally commencing in the month of July each year or any other period as determined by the Board of Governors.
- 2.4 "Academic Staff" means any person or persons imparting instructions or research activities in the University and includes faculty members comprising professors, associate professors, assistant professors and such other teaching staff and / or other posts of the University as may be treated at par with academic staff by the Board of Management from time to time.
- 2.5 "Academic Unit" means either a School, Department, Centre, Cell or a similar entity of the University designated as such by the Board of Governors.
- **2.6** "Authorities" mean the authorities defined as per Section 24 of the Act.

- 2.7 "Board of Governors" means the Board of Governors constituted as per Section 25 of the Act, hereinafter called the "BoG".
- **2.8** "Board of Management" means the Board of Management constituted as per Section 26 of the Act, hereinafter called "BoM".
- **2.9** "Campus" means the campus of the University wherever established and maintained by the University.
- 2.10 "Chancellor" means the Chancellor of the University, appointed as per Section 15 of the Act.
- **2.11** "Committees" means the committees formed under this Act or by the various authorities and officers of the University.
- **2.12** "Constituent College" means a college or institution established and maintained by the University.
- 2.13 "Controller of Examinations" means the principal officer in-charge of conduct of examinations and tests of the University and declaration of the results, hereinafter called "CoE",
- 2.14 "Contract" means an agreement entered into in writing between the University through the Registrar and an organization through its authorized person/s;
- 2.15 "Convocation" means the Convocation of the University, where honorary degrees, degrees, diplomas, academic distinctions, titles and certificates, are awarded as per the regulations of the University.
- 2.16 "Dean" means the Head of academic units such as Schools / Research Development Cell.
- **2.17** "**Degree**" means degree awarded by the University with / without specialization as per the Regulations of the University.
- 2.18 "Employee" means Academic Staff and Non-Academic Staff of the University.
- 2.19 "Estate Committee" means a body that will deal with matters pertaining to physical and infrastructural facilities in the University including estates, construction, maintenance etc.
- 2.20 "Ex-Officio Member" means a person who is a member of an authority or any other body/committee of the University by virtue of his office/position outside or within the University.
- **2.21** "Finance Committee" means the Finance Committee constituted as per Section 28 of the Act.
- 2.22 "Finance Officer" means The Finance Officer appointed as per Section 22 of the Act.

- **2.23** "Financial Year" means the period commencing on 1st of April of each year and concluding at the end of 31st March of the following year.
- **2.24** "Government" means the Government of Karnataka.
- 2.25 "Head of Department" means a person nominated by the Vice Chancellor to act on his or her behalf for academic leadership and management of designated department.
- 2.26 "Karnataka State Higher Education Council (KSHEC)" means the Karnataka State Higher Education Council constituted under section 3 of the Karnataka Higher Education Council Act, 2010 (Karnataka Act 26 of 2010).
- 2.27 "Non-Academic Staff" means any person or persons who have no instructional responsibilities in the University.
- 2.28 "Non-Academic Units" means units which do not involve teaching and research.
- 2.29 "NAAC" National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) is a government organization in India, that assesses and accredits Higher Education Institutions (HEIs).
- 2.30 "Outreach Activity" means an extension activity carried out by the University in the services to the society at large and as specified by the statutes.
- **2.31** "Prescribed" means prescribed by rules made by the Government under this Act;
- 2.32 "Principal in relation to a Constituent College" means the Head of the Constituent College and includes, where there is no Principal or in the absence of the Principal appointed, the Vice-Principal or any other person for the time being appointed to act as Principal of the constituent college.
- **2.33** "**Pro-Chancellor**" means the Pro-Chancellor appointed pursuant to statute/s of the University as per Section 16 of the Act.
- 2.34 "Pro-Vice-Chancellor" means Pro-Vice-Chancellor/s of the University appointed as per Section 18 of the Act.
- 2.35 "Pro-Visitor" means the Pro-Visitor of the University as defined in Section 14 of the Act.
- 2.36 "Public-Private Partnership University" means the University partially funded by the State and Central Governments and administered by the Sponsoring body.
- 2.37 "Registrar" means the Registrar of the University appointed as per Section 20 of the Act.
- **2.38** "**Regulation**" means the regulation of the University.
- 2.39 "Regulatory Bodies" means bodies established by the Central Government and State Government for laying down norms and conditions for ensuring academic standards

of higher education, in their designated areas of coverage, including University Grants Commission (UGC), All India Council of Technical Education (AICTE), Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), Indian Council for Social Sciences Research (ICSSR), National Council for Academic staff Education (NCTE), Distance Education Council and such other statutory bodies as may be established or incorporated by the Central Government and by the State Government for the purpose of regulating higher education.

- **2.40** "Research and Innovation Council" means the Research and Innovation Council constituted as per Section 29 of the Act.
- **2.41** "Regulations" means rules or directives made by the University.
- 2.42 "School" means an academic unit of the University which may be a combination of different departments, units, or a single academic unit as approved by the BoG.
- 2.43 "Society" means the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES) registered under the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 (Karnataka Act 17 of 1960)
- 2.44 "Sponsoring Body" in relation to this Act means the Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society (BJES), registered under the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 (Karnataka Act 17 of 1960);
- **2.45** "State" means the State of Karnataka.
- **2.46** "Statute" means a Statute of the University made or revised by the Board, in accordance with the provisions of Section 35 of the Act.
- 2.47 "Student" means a student of the University and includes any person enrolled in the University for pursuing any course of study for a degree, diploma, certificate or any other academic distinction duly instituted by the University, including a research degree.
- 2.48 "Study Centre" means a centre established and maintained by the University for the purpose of advising, counselling or for rendering any other assistance required by the students in the context of education;
- 2.49 "University" means St. Joseph's University, established and incorporated under this Act by upgrading St. Joseph's College (Autonomous), Bengaluru, which is a minority Institution, under the provisions of RUSA 2.0 and as a public-private-partnership University.
- 2.50 "University Grants Commission (UGC)" means the Commission established under section 4 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (Central Act 3 of 1956);

- 2.51 "Vice-Chancellor" means the Vice-Chancellor of St Joseph's University appointed as per Section 17 of the Act.
- **2.52** "Visitor" means the Visitor of the University as defined in Section 13 of the Act.

3. Vision, Mission, Values and Motto

3.1. Vision

'To form men and women for and with others, who through holistic education, strive for a just, secular, democratic, and ecologically sensitive society which empowers the poor, the oppressed and the marginalized.'

3.2. Mission

In keeping with the Jesuit heritage, the university aims at an integral formation of the staff and the students, to be men and women who will be agents of societal change, by enabling them to attain academic and human excellence in a teaching-learning environment that fosters intellectual curiosity, ceaseless enquiry, personal integrity, social commitment, creativity, critical thinking, and innovation.

In pursuit of this Vision and Mission, St. Joseph's University will strive towards being acknowledged and recognized among the foremost centres of higher learning in India that:

- (i) Is committed to academic excellence, fosters intellectual rigor, encourages innovation, free enquiry, and the discovery of knowledge and new ideas.
- (ii) Empowers its students and enables critical thinking, complex problemsolving, effective communication, teamwork, and innovation for impact and change.
- (iii) Nurtures a faculty of scholars who are engaged with and accessible to students and devoted to a meaningful integration of teaching and research. They focus on providing students with foundational knowledge and disciplinary depth, while encouraging them to find unexplored connections across disciplines, leading to innovate outcomes.

- (iv) Constantly and on an ongoing basis, reviews curriculum and pedagogy to ensure these are always contemporary, futuristic, and continuously explore new frontiers of knowledge.
- (v) Prepares young men and women to contribute to the betterment of the nation and the wellbeing of humankind, and apart from their educational attainments, inculcate in them a social purpose and an ethical mind-set, and a desire to passionately pursue purpose and meaning in their lives.

3.3. Values

St Joseph's University is focused on nurturing a vibrant academic environment anchored in a framework of core values that constitute the foundation of Jesuit education:

'Cura Personalis' - emphasises the view that each person is a unique creation of God. 'Cura Personalis' (meaning 'care of whole self') is demonstrated by personal attention in the classroom, a deep respect for diversity and an emphasis on holistic care for the mind, body and spirit;

Discernment - **Discernment** encourages students to be open to God's spirit as they make decisions and take actions that contribute to the greater good. Discernment is practiced through prayer, reflection, consultation with others and considering the full impact of actions from diverse perspectives;

Finding God in all things – A Jesuit education is one grounded in the presence of God, and encompasses imagination, emotion and intellect. The Jesuit Vision encourages students to see the divine in all things – in all people and cultures, in all areas of study and learning, and in every human experience;

'Magis' – A commitment to the concept of 'Magis' is a hallmark of Jesuit education. It challenges students to go beyond what is expected, interacting with the world with generosity, excellence and empathy. 'Magis' is modelled by personal accountability and high expectations and achievement;

Reflection - A foundational value of Jesuit education is the practice of reflection. Students are invited to pause and consider the world around them and their place within it, before making decisions. This includes challenging the status quo, acknowledging biases and accepting responsibility for action;

Service rooted in justice and love - Jesuit education cultivates critical awareness of social and personal evil, but points out that God's love is more powerful. This value is illustrated through community service programs, immersion experiences, and various volunteering opportunities for students;

Solidarity and kinship – Students work together for the greater good. They develop relationships with their surrounding communities and share their talents and skills to help and serve others. This value is practiced through community-engaged learning, where students work with community members to come up with innovative solutions.

3.4 Motto

Fide et Labore meaning Faith and Toil

4. Public-Private-Partnership University

St Joseph's University is a public-private-partnership institution which has aided and unaided components.

- All aided components of the University are financially aided by the State and Central Government and administered by the Sponsoring Body;
- All unaided components of the University are administered and run by the Sponsoring Body.

This would imply that St Joseph's University has Academic and Non-Academic Staff in both aided and unaided categories.

5. General Conditions

- **5.1.** Unless expressly intended or provided otherwise, words and expressions used in these Statutes shall carry the same meaning as in the Act.
- **5.2.** A schedule appended to a Statute forms an integral part of the Statute to which it is appended.
- **5.3.** Pronouns denoting the masculine gender or the feminine gender are used in the traditional sense of 'person' and thus shall be taken to be inclusive of all genders.

CHAPTER II

Objects, Powers & Functions of the University

7. Objects of the University

The objects of the University shall be to create, organize, preserve and disseminate knowledge in one or more fields for advancement of the student community in particular and humankind in general and the University shall employ a broad range of strategies to achieve its vision, including the pursuit and practice of ethics and values. With this in mind the University gives to itself the following objectives:

- i. to provide for teaching, instruction, training, consultancy, research and development in relevant disciplines of higher education, and to make provision for innovation, advancement and dissemination of knowledge in these disciplines and such other objects as the Sponsoring Body may deem fit. The University will take prior approval of the Government for programmes under the aided component and will take appropriate statutory approvals from time to time for the unaided component.
- to design and deliver high quality training, capacity building and development systems for academic staffs, professionals and administrators in education and other allied systems;
- to develop resource centres with a view to ensure the highest possible quality in the education offered;
- iv. to institute degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions like award of credits on the basis of successful completion of academic work as evaluated through various methods of assessment;
- to collaborate with any other universities, research institutions, non-profit
 organizations, industries, industry associations, professional associations or other
 organizations, as well as to offer specific education and research programs, training
 programs and exchange programs for students, faculty members and others;
- vi. to disseminate knowledge and develop a public debate on issues of higher education and allied development fields through seminars, conferences, executive education

- programs, community development programs, publications and training programs and events;
- vii. to initiate programs for the development and training of faculty and researchers of the University;
- viii. to undertake inter-disciplinary and multi-disciplinary collaborative research in cooperation with any other organization
- ix. to consider undertaking any objectives for the enhancement of higher education and other development sectors in India.

8. Powers and functions of the University

The University shall have the following powers, and functions, namely;

- to establish and maintain campuses, regional centres and study centres in the State as
 may be determined by the University from time to time in the manner laid down by the
 Statutes with prior approval of the Government and the UGC as per UGC norms,
 standards and regulations;
- to confer degrees or other academic distinctions in the manner and under conditions laid down in the regulations;
- iii. to institute and award fellowships, scholarships and prizes, medals etc., in accordance with the regulations.
- iv. to demand and receive such legally permissible fees, bills, invoices and collect charges as may be fixed by the regulations, as the case may be;
- to make provisions for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for students and employees, as the case may be;
- vi. to make appointments of employees to the University or to a constituent college, or campuses, regional centres, study centres and off-campus centres;
- vii. to receive voluntary donations and gifts of any kind not prohibited by any law from time to time and to acquire, hold, manage, maintain and dispose of any movable or immovable property, including Trust and Endowment properties for the purpose of the University or a constituent college or a campus, regional centres and study centres;
- viii. to institute and maintain hostels and to recognize places of residence for students of the University or a constituent college or off-campus centres;

- ix. to supervise and control the residences and to regulate the discipline among the students and all categories of employees and to lay down the conditions of service of such employees, including the Code of Conduct for students and employees;
- x. to create academic, administrative and support staff and other necessary posts;
- xi. to co-operate and collaborate with other Universities in such a manner and for such purposes as the University may determine from time to time;
- xii. to organize and conduct refresher courses, orientation courses, workshops, seminars, conferences and activities of similar nature;
- xiii. to determine standards of admission to the University or a constituent college, with the approval of the Academic Council and to offer admission to students of Karnataka on a scale not less than the extent provided for in the Act;
- xiv. to institute degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions on the basis of examination or any other method of evaluation approved by the Government;
- xv. to provide for the preparation of instructional materials in electronic and print media;
- xvi. to raise, collect, subscribe and borrow money with the approval of the Board of Governors on the security of the property of the University, for the purposes of the University;
- xvii. to acquire, take over and manage any other educational institutions with the prior approval of the Government;
- xviii. to acquire properties with the prior approval of the Sponsoring Body;
- xix. to create from time to time, continue, combine or close down any academic units such as departments, schools, research or other centres including service centres, divisions on the recommendation of the Academic Council, concurrence by Board of Management and approval by the Board of Governors.
- xx. to undertake any other activities connected with, or incidental to, the above objectives of the University.
- xxi. to carry out all such other activities as may be necessary or feasible in furtherance of the objects of the University.
- xxii. to start new programs

CHAPTER III

University Governance

9. Authorities of the University

In exercise of the powers conferred as per Section 24 of the Act, the University shall have the following Authorities.

- i. Board of Governors
- ii. Board of Management
- iii. Academic Council
- iv. Finance Committee
- v. Research and Innovation Council
- vi. Schools
- vii. Estate Committee
- viii. Faculty Review and Development Committee
- ix. Student Welfare, Engagement and Outreach Committee
- x. Information Technology and Services Committee

10. Board of Governors (BoG)

The management of the University shall vest with the Board of Governors of the University, which is constituted in accordance with the SJU Act. The Board of Governors shall be the principal governing body of the University. This body shall consist of a maximum of fourteen members.

10.1. The Board shall consist of the following members:

- (i) The Chancellor Chairperson;
- (ii) The Pro-Chancellor Member;
- (iii) The Vice-Chancellor Member

- (iv) The Principal Secretary to the Government in the Higher Education Department or his nominee not below the rank of a Deputy Secretary Ex-officio Member;
- (v) The Principal Secretary to the Government in any other relevant department or his nominee not below the rank of a Deputy Secretary - Member;
- (vi) One expert from the field of management, finance or any other specialized area, including administration, to be nominated by the Government - Member;
- (vii) Three persons nominated by the Sponsoring Body of whom one shall be a woman and one shall be external to the Body - Members;
- (viii) Two academicians nominated by the Chancellor Member;
- (ix) One Pro Vice-Chancellor, who shall be a non-voting member, to be nominated by the Chancellor on rotation, for a two-year term; and
- (x) One eminent academician as nominee of the UGC Member.
- **10.2.** The Registrar shall be the Secretary of the Board of Governors with no voting powers.
- **10.3.** The tenure of the nominated members of the Board of Governors, shall be for two-years from the date of appointment, which may be renewed.
- 10.4. All meetings of the Board of Governors shall be chaired by the Chancellor and in his absence by the Pro-Chancellor or in the absence of either of them by any member of the Board as nominated by the Chancellor. If the Chancellor has not nominated any person to Chair such a meeting, members present in the meeting shall elect the Chairperson for that meeting only from among themselves by a simple majority.
- 10.5. Quorum for all the meetings of the Board of Governors shall be five members attending and voting at such a meeting: Provided that, the presence of either the Chancellor or one nominee of the Sponsoring Body and in the absence of the Chancellor or one nominee of Sponsoring Body, the Vice Chancellor, shall always be necessary to form the quorum for any meeting of the Board of Governors.
- **10.6.** The Board of Governors shall be the principal governing body of the University and shall have the following powers:
 - i. to lay down academic / other Regulations to be pursued by the University;
 - to review decisions of the other authorities of the University if they are not in conformity with the provisions of this Act, or the Statutes, or the Regulations or the Rules;
 - iii. to nominate members to the Fee Regulation Committee;
 - iv. to approve the Budget, Annual Accounts and Annual Report of the University;

- v. to make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the earlier Statutes and Rules;
- vi. to take such decisions and steps as are found desirable for effectively carrying out the objects of the University.
- vii. to create schools, academic units and to approve degrees recommended by Academic Council.
- viii. to appoint the Statutory Auditors of the University;
- ix. to take a decision about voluntary winding up of the University.
- 10.7. The Board of Governors shall meet at least twice a year, once in every six months, or as decided by the Chancellor of the University.
- 10.8. If a member (other than ex-Officio) of the BoG fails to attend three consecutive meetings without seeking leave of absence, then he shall cease to be the member of the BoG.
- **10.9.** In case of occurrence of casual vacancy / vacancies among members of the BoG, it may be filled in accordance with Section 47 of the Act.
- **10.10.** Not less than 14 days' notice, in writing or email, of the date and place of each meeting of the BoG must be sent to each member.
- 10.11. The normal agenda of the meeting of the BoG shall be sent to each of the members of the BoG, in print or electronic form, at least three days prior to the date of the meeting.
- **10.12.** Decisions on matters;
 - All matters which come before a meeting of the BoG must be decided by a simple majority of the voting members present,
 - The Chairman at any meeting has an additional casting vote which can be exercised to decide matters when required.
- 10.13. Resolution may be proposed by Chancellor or approved by him, for circulation amongst the members of the Board for approval. If a majority of the members approve the circulated resolution, it shall be deemed to have been passed at a meeting. However, the said resolution shall be placed before the subsequent meeting of Board, for confirmation.

- **10.14.** Meetings of the BoG may be held in any one of the following modes or by a combination of them:
 - i. Physical meeting (in-person meeting)
 - ii. By conference call
 - iii. By web means of communication such other means of communication as may be approved from time to time.
 - iv. By such other means of communication that may be approved from time to time.

11. Board of Management (BoM)

- **11.1.** The Board of Management shall consist of the following members, namely:
 - The Vice Chancellor Chairperson;
 - ii. One of the Pro-Vice Chancellors nominated by the Chancellor Member;
 - iii. Two nominees of the Sponsoring Body with at least one of them being external to the Body Members;
 - iv. Two Deans or Directors of Schools/Institutes as nominated by the Vice-Chancellor by rotation for a three-year term - Members;
 - v. One Principal of a constituent college to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor by rotation for a term of two years Member;
 - vi. The Registrar-Member Secretary.
- 11.2. All meetings of the Board of Management shall be chaired by the Vice Chancellor and in the absence of the Vice Chancellor the meeting shall be chaired by one of the nominees of the Sponsoring Body. In case the Sponsoring Body has not nominated any person, then the meeting shall be chaired by the Pro-Vice-Chancellor. In the absence of any of these, the meeting shall be chaired by any other member as elected by the members present in the meeting;
- 11.3. In the event of a conflict of opinion in arriving at a decision at a meeting of the Board of Management, the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor shall be final.
 - All matters which come before any meeting of the Board of Management must be decided by a simple majority of the members present.

- The Chairman at any meeting has a vote and, in the case of an equality of votes, a casting vote.
- iii. Under extraordinary circumstances, a resolution may be proposed by the Vice-Chancellor or approved by him, for circulation among the members of the Board of Management for approval. If a majority of the members approve the circulated resolution, it shall be deemed to have been passed at a meeting. However, the said resolution shall be placed before the subsequent meeting of Board of Management, for confirmation.
- iv. All the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Management shall compulsorily be reported to the Board of Governors.
- **11.4.** The Board of Management shall meet at least four times in a year.
- 11.5. The quorum for every meeting of the Board of Management shall be one third of the membership of the BoM. Provided that the presence of either the Vice Chancellor or any one of the nominees of the Sponsoring Body, shall always be necessary to form the quorum of any meeting of the BoM.
- **11.6.** The First Board of Management shall be constituted by the Chancellor, as per Section 15 (ix) of the Act.
- **11.7.** The tenure of office of the members of BoM shall be three years from the date of appointment;
 - i. The membership of the nominated Deans shall be coterminous with the status of Deanship;
 - ii. However, if a member (other than Ex-Officio) of the BoM fails to attend three consecutive meetings without seeking leave of absence, then he / she ceases to be a member of the BoM.
- **11.8.** In case of occurrence of casual vacancy / vacancies among members, it may be filled in accordance with Section 47 of the Act.
- **11.9.** Meetings of the BoM may be held in any one of the following modes or by a combination of them:
 - i. In person meeting;
 - ii. By Conference call;
 - iii. By Web based means of communication;
 - iv. By such other means of communication that may be approved from time to time.

- **11.10.** The Board of Management shall have the following powers and functions;
 - It shall recommend for adoption all academic programmes formulated by the Academic Council of the University.
 - ii. The Board of Management shall, subject to the control of the BoG, manage and administer the revenues and properties of the University and conduct all the administrative affairs of the University not otherwise provided for.
 - To recommend personnel selected (both academic and administrative) to the Board of Governors for approval.
 - It shall lay down guidelines for ensuring discipline among the employees and students of the University.
 - It shall initiate disciplinary action against those violating University Statutes, Regulations, Rules, etc., and submit the same to the Board of Governors for decision.
 - vi. The Board of Management shall prepare, with the assistance of the Finance Officer, the financial estimates for the ensuing year, get them scrutinized by the Finance Committee and place the same before the BoG.
 - vii. It shall prepare the Annual Report to be submitted to the BoG for approval.
 - viii. It shall be responsible for conduct of the convocation of the University.
 - ix. To propose the first Statutes to the BoG for its approval.
 - x. To advise the Academic Council and Research and Innovation Council in matters which have a bearing on the administration and management of the University.
 - xi. To accept, reject or refer back any recommendation made by the Academic Council or the Research and Innovation Council, provided that no such recommendation may be rejected unless the Academic Council or the Research & Innovation Council, as the case may be, is informed of the reasons for such rejection and is given an opportunity to comment thereon to the BoM.
 - xii. To exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Governors.

12. Academic Council

12.1. The Academic Council is the principal, academic policy making body of the University. The Academic Council shall, subject to the provisions of the Act, Statutes, and Regulations, have control over, and responsibility for, the maintenance of standards of instruction, education and evaluations and conferment of undergraduate and post-graduate degrees, research degrees, diplomas and other awards and titles in the University. It shall coordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic Regulations of the University.

12.2. The Academic Council shall consist of the following:

i. The Vice-Chancellor - Chairperson;

ii. The Pro-Vice-Chancellors - Member;

iii. The Controller of Examinations - Member;

iv. One Nominee of the Board of Governors - Member;

v. One Nominee of the Board of Management - Member;

vi. All the Deans / Directors - Members:

vii. All the Heads of Departments - Members;

viii. All the Program Coordinators - Members;

ix. The Librarian - Member;

x. Physical Education Director - Member;

xi. Dean of Research and Innovation Council - Member

xii. IQAC Director - Member;

xiii. Not less than four experts outside the university to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor representing areas such as Industry, Commerce, Law, Education, Medicine, Engineering, Social work, Culture and Arts etc. either from a pool of names suggested by the Deans and Directors or by any other member as per the discretion of the Vice Chancellor - Members.

xiv. Not less than four eminent educationists related to the disciplines offered by the University to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor either from a pool of names suggested by the Deans and Directors or any other member as per the discretion of the Vice Chancellor - Members.

- xv. Two members of the teaching staff to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor from the cadres of Associate Professors and Assistant Professors of the University in the order of seniority and on rotation -Members;
- xvi. The Registrar Member-Secretary.
- **12.3.** The Academic Council shall meet at least two times in a year. The Vice-Chancellor may call for a special meeting of the Academic Council if necessary.
- **12.4.** The quorum for every meeting of the Academic Council shall be one third of the membership of the Council.
- **12.5.** The meetings of the Academic Council shall be convened by the Registrar with the approval of the Vice Chancellor.
- 12.6. The Academic Council shall be responsible for the approval of academic programmes submitted by the various Schools / Institutes of the University and also by the members of the Council.
- 12.7. The Academic Council shall lay down and decide new academic programmes and Regulations for academic enhancement and for achieving excellence in the University.
- **12.8.** The First Academic Council shall be constituted by the Chancellor in accordance with Section 15 (ix) of the Act.
- 12.9. The tenure of office of the members of Academic Council shall be the date of completion of three years from the date of appointment; or until the date of superannuation, whichever comes earlier.
- **12.10.** The membership of the nominated Deans/Directors shall be coterminous with the status of Deanship/Directorship; However, if a member of the Academic Council fails to attend 3 consecutive meetings without seeking leave of absence, then he / she ceases to be a member of the Academic Council.
- **12.11.** A temporary vacancy, arising in the Academic Council, from among the Nominated Members, may be filled by the Chairperson, in consultation with the Chancellor, and such members shall hold office for the remaining period of the current term of the member who has vacated office.

12.12. Powers and Responsibilities of the Academic Council

- The Academic Council shall have the powers to coordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic Regulations, programmes and activities of the University;
- The Academic Council shall be responsible for fixing the quality and standards of the academic activities of the University;
- iii. The Academic Council shall have powers to recommend award of degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions to persons who qualify themselves for award, after successful completion of the requirement of the award;
- The Academic Council shall have powers to recommend award of honorary degrees to eminent personalities;
- The Academic Council shall have powers to stipulate or specify the qualifications for making admissions to various programmes in the University;
- vi. The Academic Council shall have powers to recommend, repeal or withdraw any diploma / certificate / any other award of the University. However, it shall seek the approval of the Board of Governors in all such matters;
- vii. The Academic Council may, by resolution, constitute and appoint any Committee/s with such membership and on such terms and conditions and with such powers and duties as it thinks fit. The powers delegated under this clause are revocable by a resolution of the Academic Council at any time.
- viii. To exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be specified by the BoG.

13. Finance Committee

- **13.1.** The Finance Committee shall consist of the following:
 - The Chancellor or his nominee Chairperson
 - ii. The Pro-Chancellor Member;
 - iii. The Vice-Chancellor Member;
 - iv. The Registrar Member;
 - v. The Finance Officer Secretary;
 - vi. One nominee of the Sponsoring Body Member;
 - vii. One nominee of the Chancellor with expertise in Banking, Finance or Accountancy - Member, and
 - viii. Two external nominees, who will be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor Members
- 13.2. The Finance Committee shall be the principal financial body of the University to take up financial matters and shall, subject to the provisions of the Act, Statutes, Regulations and Rules, exercise general supervision over the financial matters of the University.
- **13.3.** The Finance Committee shall meet at least four times in a year. The Chancellor may call for a special meeting of the Finance Committee if necessary.
- **13.4.** The quorum for every meeting of the Finance Committee shall be one third of the membership of the Committee.
- 13.5. The tenure of office of the members of Finance Committee shall be three years from date of appointment, However, if a member of the Finance Committee fails to attend three consecutive meetings without seeking leave of absence. then he / she ceases to be the member of the Finance Committee.
- **13.6.** A temporary vacancy, arising in the Finance Committee, from amongst the nominated members, may be filled by Chancellor.
- **13.7.** Under extenuating circumstances, the Board of Governors (BoG) may reconstitute the Finance Committee before the end of its tenure.
- **13.8.** Powers and responsibilities of the Finance Committee

- The Finance Committee shall be the principal financial body of the University and shall exercise general supervision over all financial matters of the University;
- The Finance Committee shall scrutinize the annual budget and annual income of the University and report the same to the Board of Governors.
- iii. The Finance Committee shall give its views / recommendations on the request of the Board of Governors or Vice-Chancellor on issues relating to financial affairs of the University.
- The Finance Committee shall provide advice, prepare guidelines and processes for mobilization of resources for the University;
- v. The Finance Committee shall perform any other duties assigned to it by the Board of Governors;
- vi. The Finance Committee shall be responsible for laying down Regulations on investments of surplus funds of the University, through an investment committee or otherwise;
- vii. The Finance Committee, with the approval of the Board of Governors, may borrow money by way of mortgage, overdraft or otherwise from an approved financial institution / bank and for this purpose enter into and perform financial arrangements with such lending institutions / banks;
- viii. The Finance Committee may, by resolution, constitute and appoint any Committee or Committees with such membership on such terms and conditions and with such powers and duties as it thinks fit. The powers delegated under this clause are revocable by a resolution of the Finance Committee at any time.
- ix. The Finance Committee shall prepare status reports of the finances and submit the same to the Chancellor of the University once every six months.
- x. The Finance Committee shall initiate action against those defaulting and mismanaging the finances of the University and place the same for consideration and action by the BoM.
- xi. The Finance Committee shall prepare the annual budget and complete the annual audit of accounts and submit it to BoM.
- All the statutory requirements are to be fulfilled by the Finance Officer on behalf of the Finance Committee.
- **13.9.** The First Finance Committee shall be constituted by the Chancellor in accordance with Section 15 (ix) of the Act.

14. Research and Innovation Council

- 14.1. The Research and Innovation Council shall co-ordinate and exercise, subject to the provisions of the Act, the Statutes, the Regulations and the Rules, general supervision over the research and innovation of the University. The Research and Innovation Council shall provide the larger holistic vision of the kind of research to be undertaken by the University, including prioritization of the research areas and shall also be responsible fostering innovation and entrepreneurship in the University.
- **14.2.** The Research and Innovation Council shall consist of the following, namely;

. The Vice- Chancellor - Chairperson

ii. The Pro Vice-Chancellor/s - Member

iii. Deans of all Schools - Members

- iv. Up to Ten External / Internal Members being eminent Academicians, Research and industry experts to be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor Members
- v. The Dean of Research & Innovation Member Secretary
- **14.3.** The Research and Innovation Council shall meet at least once every six months or as directed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- **14.4.** There shall be a Dean of Research and Innovation to coordinate the research activities in the University, appointed by the Vice Chancellor for a period of three years.
- **14.5.** The Dean of Research and Innovation shall be the Member Secretary of the Council.
- 14.6. The report of the activities of the Council shall be submitted to the Board of Management for information once in every six months.
- 14.7. The Vice Chancellor may invite eminent persons in the field of research and innovation to be members of the Council for a period not exceeding two years at a time.
- **14.8.** The First Research and Innovation Council shall be constituted by the Chancellor in accordance with the Section 15 (ix) of the Act.
- **14.9.** The tenure of office of the members of Research and Innovation Council shall be two years from the date of appointment.
- **14.10.** The membership of the nominated Deans shall be coterminous with the status of Deanship. However, if a member of the Research and Innovation Council fails to

- attend three consecutive meetings without seeking leave of absence, then he / she ceases to be the member of the Research and Innovation Council.
- **14.11.** A temporary vacancy, arising in the Research & Innovation Council, from amongst the appointed members, may be filled by the Chairperson, in consultation with the Chancellor, and such member shall hold office for the remaining period of the current term of the member who has vacated office.
- 14.12. Powers and responsibilities of the Research & Innovation Council:
 - The Research and Innovation Council shall be principally responsible for all research and development and innovation activities of the University and will be responsible for the formulation of research and innovation Regulations, research programmes and guidelines of the University.
 - ii. Foster research activities and also dissemination of research results.
 - iii. Coordinate and promote the research culture of the University.
 - Formulate, coordinate and supervise the involvement of the University in activities such as lifelong learning, industrial research, innovation and IP related issues.
 - v. Coordinate and manage sponsored research projects of the University.
 - vi. Coordinate and manage activities of the University in respect of collaborative programmes with other institutions / industries, within the country and in coordination with Director, Global Initiatives for overseas collaborative activities.
 - vii. The Research & Innovation Council may, by resolution, constitute and appoint any committees with such membership and on such terms and conditions and with such powers and duties as it thinks fit. The powers delegated under this clause are revocable by a resolution of the Research & Innovation Council at any time.
 - viii. The Research & Innovation Council shall strive to create an ecosystem that supports consultancy, entrepreneurship, incubation, and awareness of patent and intellectual property rights.
 - ix. The Research & Innovation Council may in consultation with the Vice-Chancellor, by resolution, constitute and appoint relevant committees with such membership and on such terms and conditions and with such powers and duties as it deems fit. The powers delegated under this clause are revocable by resolution of the Research & Innovation Council.

- 14.13. The Research & Innovation Council shall meet as many times as required; with a minimum of two meetings every year. The Vice-Chancellor may call for a special meeting of the Research & Innovation Council if necessary.
- 14.14. The quorum for meetings of the Research & Innovation Council shall be at least one third of the members of the Council and voting at such meeting, provided that the presence of either the Vice-Chancellor or any one of the nominees of the Vice-Chancellor, shall always be necessary to form the quorum of any meeting of the Research & Innovation Council.
- **14.15.** Under extenuating circumstances, the Board of Management may reconstitute the Research and Innovation Council before the expiry of its term.

15. Schools

The Academic Units shall be grouped into Schools as per the requirements of the University. The Dean will be the head of the School as and when created and will be appointed by the process mentioned in Regulations of the University.

15.1. Meetings of Schools

- The Dean should call for the meetings of the respective Schools at least twice in a semester and the minutes of the meeting are to be submitted to the Vice-Chancellor within two days of the meetings taking place.
- ii. Composition of the Schools Meetings
 - i. The Dean Chairman;
 - ii. One of the HoDs nominated by the Dean Member Secretary;
 - iii. All Academic Staff of All Departments Members
- iii. The recommendations of the Schools will be placed before the Vice-Chancellor, and the Academic Council.
- iv. Special meetings may be called by the Dean at the suggestion of the Vice-Chancellor or on a written request from at least one-fifth of the members of the School.

16. Estate Committee

- **16.1.** The Estate Committee shall be the principal body of the University, dealing with all matters pertaining to physical and infrastructural facilities in the University including estates, construction, maintenance etc.
- **16.2.** The Estate Committee shall consist of the following:

i.	The Pro – Chancellor	Chairperson
ii.	The Vice-Chancellor	Member
iii.	Two nominees of the Sponsoring Body	Member/s
iv.	The Finance Officer	Member
v.	One nominee of the Board of Governors	Member
vi.	Three experts nominated by the Vice-Chancellor	Member/s
vii.	The Registrar	Member Secretary

- **16.3.** The tenure of office of the members of the Estate Committee shall be three years from their date of appointment; the membership of the nominated members shall be coterminous with the status of the nominating body.
- **16.4.** A temporary vacancy, arising in the Estate Committee, from amongst the nominated members, may be filled by the appropriate authority.
- **16.5.** The Estate Committee shall meet as many times as required, at least two times in a year. The Pro-Chancellor may call for a special meeting of the Estate Committee if necessary.
- 16.6. The quorum for meetings of the Estate Committee shall be at least one third members present and voting at such meeting. Provided that the presence of either the Pro-Chancellor or any one of the nominees of the Sponsoring Body, shall always be necessary to form the quorum of any meeting of the Estate Committee.
- **16.7.** Powers and responsibilities of the Estate Committee;
 - The Estate Committee shall be the principal body of the University that is responsible for all activities relating to creation and maintenance of estates, estate planning, physical infrastructure facilities, structural facilities in the

- University, including necessary responsibilities pertaining to construction civil, mechanical, electrical, etc;
- ii. The Estate Committee is empowered to perform such other duties and functions in the matters of creation, acquisition and maintenance of land and buildings of the University as will be necessary from time to time;
- iii. The Estate Committee may, by resolution, constitute and appoint any Committee or Committees with such membership on such terms and conditions and with such powers and duties as it thinks fit. The powers delegated under this clause are revocable by a resolution of the Estate Committee at any time;

17. Faculty Review and Development Committee

- **17.1.** The Vice-Chancellor shall constitute a Faculty Review and Development Committee with the primary purpose of raising the quality index of faculty and enhancing the learning experience of students.
- **17.2.** The Faculty Review and Development Committee will be comprised of the following:
 - i. Vice-Chancellor Chairperson
 - ii. Pro Vice-Chancellors Members;
 - iii. Registrar Member;
 - iv. Deans Members;
 - v. IQAC Director Member;
 - vi. Chief Human Resources Officer Member;
 - vii. Five members of Faculty nominated by the Vice-Chancellor in consultation with the Deans Members;
 - viii. Two eminent educationists from outside the University Members

The members of Faculty and educationists from outside the University, will serve for a period of three years, after which they would be replaced by new incumbents. One of the Deans will serve as Secretary to the Committee. The Committee will meet twice a year and the minutes of meetings will be shared with the Board of Management.

- **17.3.** The Faculty Review and Development Committee is expected:
 - to engage in a periodic review of the Faculty of the University in order to ensure that the highest standards of teaching and learning are maintained;
 - to review the performance appraisal reviews of Faculty members as well as their development plans;
 - to systematically and on an ongoing basis, review student feedback to determine ways and means of enhancing the quality of teaching and learning at the University;
 - to consider ways and means of enabling Faculty remain contemporary in their knowledge of the subjects thought, and enhancing the level of research and enquiry;
 - v. to deliberate on ways and means in which Faculty could be better exposed through self-study and exploration, utilizing sabbaticals for pursuing special courses of study in India and abroad, participating in faculty exchange programmes, presenting papers at seminars and conferences, publishing their work etc.
 - vi. to constantly and on an ongoing basis, review curriculum and pedagogy to ensure these are always contemporary, futuristic, and continuously explore new frontiers of knowledge.

18. Student Welfare, Engagement & Outreach Committee

- 18.1. The Vice-Chancellor shall constitute a Student Welfare, Engagement and Outreach Committee to focus on the needs and concerns of the student community and to look at how student life can be more engaging and enriching for the student community.
- **18.2.** The Committee will comprise of the following:
 - i. Vice-Chancellor or his nominee Chairperson;
 - ii. Deans of Schools- Members;
 - iii. Chief Human Resources Officer Member;
 - iv. Student Council Governor Member;
 - v. One Welfare Officer from each school Members;
 - vi. One Student Counsellor appointed by the Vice Chancellor Member;

- vii. President of the Student Council Member;
- **18.3.** The Student Welfare, Engagement and Outreach Committee will meet twice every year.
- **18.4.** The role of this Committee will include the following:
 - to deliberate on and suggest ways in which student life in the University can be more engaging and vibrant;
 - to ascertain what the key concerns of the students are, and to examine how the University could respond to these concerns;
 - to suggest and implement various activities such a 'town-halls', discussion groups, interactive sessions with Faculty and Administration, to encourage dialogue and build better mutual understanding;
 - iv. to respond to genuine grievances expressed by students and build a better and more meaningful rapport between students and members of Faculty and Administration;
 - to find ways and means by which students are better aligned with the Mission and Vision of the University and their feeling of belonging and stakeholder-ship is strengthened;
 - vi. to create opportunities for meaningful interaction between students and the external world, especially with disadvantaged sections of society, industry, and the not-for-profit sector;
 - vii. to create platforms and more opportunities for students to be 'listened' to;
 - viii. to look into issues of student indiscipline and recommend suitable action both remedial and punitive as considered appropriate.

19. Administrative Staff Welfare and Engagement Committee

- 19.1. The Vice-Chancellor shall constitute a Staff Welfare and Engagement Committee to focus on the needs and concerns of the staff of the University with the objective of enhancing engagement and work satisfaction.
- **19.2.** The Committee will comprise of the following:
 - i. Finance Officer Chairperson
 - Registrar

- Chief Human Resource Officer
- iv. Maintenance Manager
- v. Office Superintendent
- vi. Two members of the senior Administrative Staff appointed by the Vice Chancellor for a two-year term.
- **19.3.** The Staff Welfare and Engagement Committee will meet twice every year. Minutes of these meetings will be shared with the Vice Chancellor.
- **19.4.** The role of this Committee will include the following:
 - to ascertain what are the key concerns of Administrative Staff, and to see how the University could respond to these concerns;
 - to respond to genuine grievances expressed by Administrative Staff and build a better and more meaningful rapport between them and the University administration;
 - to look at issues of indiscipline of Administrative Staff and recommend suitable action both remedial and punitive as considered appropriate.

20. Information Technology and Services Committee

- 20.1. The primary role of the Information Technology and Services Committee is to provide and implement a strategic road-map that will provide a digital environment conducive to the needs of the Administration, Faculty, Researchers and Students of the University.
- **20.2.** The Committee will comprise of the following:
 - Registrar Chairperson;
 - ii. Finance Officer Member;
 - iii. Dean of the School of Information and Technology Member;
 - iv. Chief Information Officer* Member;
 - Two Deans nominated by the Vice Chancellor for a period of two years after which they would be replaced - Members.
 - * A chief information officer (CIO) is a professional who evaluates and improves information systems within the university. He/she is the executive responsible for the management implementation and usability of information and computer technologies.

- **20.3.** The Committee will meet twice every year and the minutes of meetings will be shared with the Vice-Chancellor.
- **20.4.** The role of this Committee will include the following:
 - to constantly review the changing educational landscape to deliver faster and personalized experiences and engagement to all stakeholders;
 - to provide a strategic road-map for technological changes required via the SMAC (social, mobile, analytics, and cloud technologies) stack in close coordination with IT operations personnel, faculty and students to enhance and enrich the learning experience;
 - iii. to provide inputs for major IT initiatives and monitor IT project priorities;
 - iv. to formulate a e-Governance policy for all stakeholders and review it periodically to mitigate potential IT risks.

CHAPTER IV

Officers of the University

21. Officers of the University

The following are the Officers of the University;

- i. The Visitor;
- ii. The Pro-visitor;
- iii. The Chancellor:
- iv. The Pro-Chancellor;
- v. The Vice-Chancellor;
- vi. The Pro Vice-Chancellor;
- vii. The Registrar;
- viii. Controller of Examinations;
- ix. The Finance Officer;
- x. The Dean of each School;
- xi. The Dean of Research & Innovation
- xii. Chief Human Resources Officer (CHRO)

The BOG may at any time and for valid reasons, designate other roles as Officers of the University.

22. The Visitor

- **22.1.** His Excellency the Governor of Karnataka shall be the Visitor of the University and the Visitor may offer suggestions for the improvement of the functioning of the University.
- **22.2.** The Visitor shall preside over the convocation;
- 22.3. The Visitor shall have the following powers, namely;
 - i. to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University;

ii. on the basis of the information received by the Visitor and being satisfied that any order, proceeding or decision taken by any Authority of the University is not in conformity with the Act, Regulations or Rules, the Visitor may issue such advice as deemed fit in the interest of the University, and the advice so issued shall be complied with by all concerned.

23. The Pro-Visitor

- **23.1.** The Honourable Minister for Higher Education of the Government of Karnataka shall be the Pro-Visitor of the University.
- **23.2.** The Pro-Visitor shall, when the Visitor is absent, preside over the Convocation.
- **23.3.** The Pro-Visitor shall have the following powers, namely:
 - i. to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University;
 - to call a meeting of the authorities of the University relating to the affairs of the University; and
 - iii. on the basis of the information received by the Pro-Visitor, he may issue such advice as deemed fit in the interest of the University.

24. The Chancellor

- **24.1.** The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body, whose term shall be as decided by the Sponsoring Body.
- 24.2. The Chancellor of the University shall be the Chairperson of the BoG.
- **24.3.** The Chancellor shall have such powers as may be conferred on him by this Act, which may include the following;
 - i. to function as the Chairperson of the BoG;
 - to preside over all the convocations of the University in the absence of the Visitor and Pro-Visitor;
 - iii. to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, in accordance with the provisions of the Act and the Statutes;
 - iv. to nominate a person as a member of the Nomination Committee as per the Act;

- v. to appoint the first Registrar and the first Finance Officer;
- vi. to nominate two academicians as members on the BoG;
- vii. to approve the appointment of Pro-Vice-Chancellor(s);
- viii. to constitute the first BoM, the first Academic Council, the first Finance Committee and other Authorities;
- ix. to approve the main agenda and any other matters in the BoG in the manner provided for in the Act; and
- to resolve a conflict and in the manner provided for in this Act;
- **24.4.** In the event of there being a conflict inter-se between any authorities of the University, then the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.

25. The Pro-Chancellor

- 25.1. The Pro-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body in consultation with the Chancellor. The Pro-Chancellor shall assist the Chancellor in all such matters required by the Chancellor. The role and responsibilities of the Pro-Chancellor shall be:
 - To preside over the convocation in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor and Chancellor.
 - **ii.** To chair such committees, authorities, meetings and convocations in the absence of the Chancellor.
- **25.2.** The services of the Pro-Chancellor may be terminated by the Chancellor at any point of time as he deems fit.

26. The Vice-Chancellor

26.1. The Vice-Chancellor shall be the Principal Executive and Academic Officer of the University and shall exercise general supervision and control over the affairs of the University and give effect to the decisions of the authorities of the University.

- **26.2.** The first Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor as per Section 4 (6) of the Act.
- **26.3.** The subsequent Vice-Chancellor/s shall be appointed by the Chancellor from among three persons recommended by the Search Committee as specified in the Act.
- 26.4. The Vice-Chancellor shall hold the office for a period of four years from the date of assumption of the office or till superannuation (70 years), whichever is earlier and may be reappointed for a period of four years as per Section 17(1) of the Act. The Vice-Chancellor shall continue to hold the office even after expiry of his term till the new Vice-Chancellor is appointed. However, in any case this period shall not exceed one year.
- **26.5.** The Vice-Chancellor shall have the following powers, duties and responsibilities:
 - To exercise general supervision and control over the affairs of the University and to give effect to the decisions of the Authorities of the University.
 - ii. To form / constitute committees / groups / panels / units, deemed necessary for obtaining competent / expert advice and / or recommendations on various issues / matters of the University. The said committees / groups / panels / units shall automatically stand dissolved on completion of their tenure or on completion of the task assigned, whichever is earlier.
 - To delegate any of the Pro Vice-Chancellors / Officers to be in-charge of the position of the Vice-Chancellor, temporarily.
 - iv. To initiate steps to appoint a new Vice-Chancellor as per Section 17 (2) & (3) of the Act.
 - The Vice-Chancellor shall ensure that the provisions of the Act, Statutes,
 Ordinances and Regulations are duly followed.
 - vi. The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to be present at and to address any meeting of an Authority or any units of the University.
 - vii. The Vice-Chancellor shall have the power to convene the meetings of various committees and sub-committees, not specified in these statutes.
 - viii. Provided that, where any matter, other than the appointment of an academic staff is of urgent nature requiring immediate action and the same could not be immediately dealt with by any officer or the authority or other body of the University empowered by or under this Act to deal with it, the Vice-Chancellor may take such action as he may deem fit with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.

- ix. Provided that, where in the opinion of the Vice-Chancellor, any decision of any authority of the University is outside the powers conferred by this Act or by the Statutes, Regulations or Rules made thereunder or is likely to be prejudicial to the interests of the University, he shall request the concerned authority to revise its decision within fifteen days from the date of its decision and in case the authority refuses to revise such decision wholly or partly or fails to take any decision within fifteen days, then such matter shall be referred to the Chancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.
- x. The Vice-Chancellor shall preside over the Convocation in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor, Chancellor and Pro-Chancellor.
- xi. The Vice-Chancellor shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be laid down by the Statutes, Regulations or the Rules:
- 26.6. The services of the Vice-Chancellor can be terminated by the Chancellor with the approval of the BoG after following the principles of natural justice and after providing an opportunity to the Vice-Chancellor to present his case including with regard to termination on disciplinary grounds.
- 26.7. The Vice-Chancellor may resign from his office, after giving three months' notice and shall cease to hold his office on the acceptance of his resignation by the Chancellor or on expiry of the notice period whichever is earlier. The requirement of the notice period may be waived off by the Chancellor at his discretion.

27. The Pro-Vice-Chancellor(s)

- 27.1. The Vice-Chancellor may appoint up to a maximum of three Pro-Vice-Chancellors with the prior written approval of the Chancellor. The Pro-Vice-Chancellors, so appointed, will have designated areas of responsibility and shall hold office for such periods, as the Vice-Chancellor shall determine or deem fit in consultation with the Chancellor.
- **27.2.** However, the first Pro-Vice-Chancellor(s) shall be appointed by the Chancellor as per Section 4(6) of the Act.

- 27.3. The Pro-Vice-Chancellor/s shall normally have a tenure of three years initially, which is either renewable or prematurely revocable by the Vice-Chancellor in consultation with the Chancellor.
- **27.4.** The terms and conditions of employment of the Pro-Vice-Chancellor/s shall be those contained in his or her contract of employment.
- **27.5.** The Pro-Vice-Chancellor/s shall assist and exercise duties and responsibilities as assigned to them by the Vice-Chancellor.
- 27.6. In the absence of the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor nominated by the Vice-Chancellor, shall discharge day-to-day duties of the office of the Vice-Chancellor, unless otherwise directed by the Chancellor.
- 27.7. The actions taken by the Pro-Vice-Chancellor/s in furtherance of their functions shall be subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor and in the absence of the Vice-Chancellor shall be subject to the approval of the Chancellor.

28. The Registrar

i.

iv.

The Vice-Chancellor

- **28.1.** The First Registrar shall be appointed by the Chancellor. Subsequent Registrars shall be appointed by the Chancellor as the chairperson of BoG on the recommendations of a duly constituted selection committee.
- **28.2.** A Search-cum-selection Committee consisting of the following, will recommend a panel of suitable candidates for the position of the Registrar, to the Chancellor.

Convenor

ii. One nominee of the Board Member

iii. One nominee of the Chancellor Member

28.3. The terms and conditions of employment of the Registrar shall be as per those contained in his/her contract of employment.

One outside expert nominated by the Vice-Chancellor

28.4. The Registrar shall have a tenure of three years initially, which is renewable for further term/s.

- 28.5. If the office of the Registrar falls vacant temporarily, the said duties shall be assigned to a deputy-registrar, provided that such officiating registrar shall discharge only the routine duties and responsibilities of the post of Registrar and any decision on policy and other important matters shall be taken up by the Vice-Chancellor.
- **28.6.** The Registrar may resign from his office, after giving three months' notice and shall cease to hold his office on the acceptance of his resignation by the Chancellor or on expiry of the notice period, whichever is earlier. The requirement of the notice period may be waived off by the Chancellor at his discretion.
- **28.7.** The Registrar shall have the following powers and responsibilities:
 - Shall be the custodian of all assets, records, common seal, agenda and minutes
 of authorities/committees/Boards and all legal documentation and records of the
 University;
 - Shall be responsible for all official correspondence, within/outside the University with the approval of the Vice-Chancellor;
 - Shall assist the Vice-Chancellor to give effect to various decisions of authorities of the University and follow-up action thereon;
 - iv. Shall represent the University in all suits and legal proceedings involving the University and authenticate relevant documents in this regard, as per Section 20(3) of the Act; The Registrar shall have the power to authenticate records on behalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as conferred by the Statutes or may be required from time to time, by the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor or the Vice-Chancellor.
 - To publish the Calendar, notifications, legislation and official records of the University as required by the statutes, or regulations of the BoG.
 - vi. Shall be the Secretary of all the academic staff recruitment selection committees (non-member).

29. Controller of Examinations

- **29.1.** The Controller of Examinations shall be the principal officer-in-charge of conducting evaluations and evaluation related activities of the University.
- **29.2.** The Vice-Chancellor may appoint the Controller of Examinations with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.
- 29.3. A Search-cum-selection Committee consisting of the following, shall recommend a panel of suitable candidates for the position of the Controller of Examinations, to the Vice-Chancellor.

i.	The Vice-Chancellor	Chairperson
ii.	Registrar	Secretary
iii.	One nominee of the BoM	Member
iv.	One nominee of the Chancellor	Member
v.	One outside expert nominated by the Vice-Chancellor	Member

- **29.4.** The terms and conditions of employment of the Controller of Examinations shall be those contained in his/her contract of employment.
- **29.5.** The Controller of Examinations shall have a tenure of three years initially, which is renewable for further term/s.
- 29.6. The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible for making all arrangements necessary for holding examinations and for declaring results by formulating the Calendar of Examinations.
- 29.7. The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible to take necessary steps to avoid malpractices in examination and evaluation processes. The Controller of Examinations shall be member secretary of the Malpractices and Disciplinary Committee in respect of examinations related matters.
- 29.8. The Controller of Examinations shall be the custodian of examination related material, and shall frame the schedule of examinations, assist committees, issue appointment orders to examination staff / examiners, announce results and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Vice-Chancellor in carrying out provisions of the Act, Statutes, Ordinances, Regulations relating to examinations.

- 29.9. The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible for reviewing, from time to time, the results of university examinations and for forwarding reports thereon to the Vice-Chancellor and the Academic Council.
- 29.10. If the office of the Controller of Examinations falls vacant temporarily, the Vice Chancellor shall, with the approval of the Chancellor, assign the said duties to any other officer.
- 29.11. The Controller of Examinations shall be responsible for the conduct of the convocation.
- **29.12.** The Controller of Examinations will carry out all activities and such other duties as may be assigned by the Vice-Chancellor from time to time.

30. Finance Officer

- **30.1.** The Finance Officer shall be appointed by the Chancellor.
- **30.2.** The terms and conditions of employment of the Finance Officer shall be those contained in his contract of employment.
- **30.3.** The Finance Officer shall have a tenure of three years initially, which is renewable for further term/s.
- 30.4. If the Office of the Finance Officer falls vacant temporarily, the said duties shall be assigned to any other officer by the Vice-Chancellor with the approval of the Chancellor.
- **30.5.** The Finance Officer is responsible for the administration of the financial affairs of the University.
- **30.6.** The Finance Officer shall be responsible for meeting all the statutory obligations in respect of Financial and Tax matters, both of the Central and the State Governments.
- **30.7.** The Finance Officer shall have the following powers, duties and responsibilities:
 - To assist the Vice-Chancellor in all matters relating to finance and to take up related responsibilities;
 - To assist the Vice-Chancellor in implementing relevant decisions taken by various authorities of the University;
 - iii. To exercise general supervision over the funds of the University and provide advice on financial Regulations of the University;

- To be responsible for the preparation of the annual accounts and budget of the University and for their presentation to the relevant Authorities;
- To perform such other financial functions as are assigned to him/her by the BoG, BoM, the Finance Committee or the Vice-Chancellor;
- vi. To be the custodian of all investment related documents and take steps to safeguard them.
- vii. To be responsible for preparation of financial statements and to assist annual statutory audit by the statutory auditor appointed by the BoG.
- viii. To be responsible for maintenance, and to update the registers of buildings, land and equipment, and for overseeing the physical verification of the stores and other facilities in the departments of the University.

31. The Deans of Schools

- **31.1.** The Academic Units shall be grouped into Schools as per the requirements of the University.
- **31.2.** Each of the Schools within the University shall be headed by a Dean.
- 31.3. The Dean of School shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor, from amongst the fulltime Academic Staff of the University, with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.
- **31.4.** The tenure of the Deans of Schools shall be three years. The Dean shall be eligible for reappointment for one more additional term. (Only one more additional term?)
- **31.5.** The Deans of Schools are responsible for the administration and academic affairs of the respective Schools in consultation with the Vice-Chancellor.
- 31.6. When the office of the Dean is vacant or when the Dean is unable to perform his/her duties due to illness or absence or for any other reason, the Vice-Chancellor with consent of the Chancellor may designate an academic staff to officiate as Dean (Acting), till the Dean resumes his/her duties or until regular appointments is made.
- **31.7.** In addition to any other powers and duties conferred or entrusted to a Dean by the Vice-Chancellor, the Dean:
 - Is responsible for the conduct and maintenance of standards of teaching and research in the School;

- Shall provide effective leadership and guidance in the policy making, curriculum planning and in the implementation of the University Regulations within the School;
- Oversees the academic, educational, research and administrative business of the School and its Departments;
- iv. Is responsible for curriculum delivery, project work, group work, internal assessment scores of all programmes offered by the School;
- Shall discharge the responsibilities associated with various programmes including Doctoral programmes.
- vi. To oversee the conduct of workshops, seminars on curriculum, teaching methods, testing and evaluation with internal or external resource persons.
- vii. Supervise the preparation and submission of the report of all activities conducted by the School during the academic year to the office of the Vice-Chancellor and the documentation centre, before the deadline set by the office of the Vice-Chancellor.
- viii. Shall have the right to be present and to speak at any of the meetings of the Board of Studies of the departments within the School.
- ix. Shall attend the Meetings of the Deans and shall ensure that the decisions taken thereof are implemented in letter and spirit.
- Is responsible for supervising student mentoring activities of their respective schools.
- Deans shall oversee the conduct of remedial classes for academically weak students.
- xii. Shall take necessary measures to monitor the attendance and academic progress of students of their respective school.

32. The Dean of Research & Innovation

- **32.1.** The Dean of Research & Innovation shall:
 - Be the full-time salaried officer of the University and act as the Head of the Research & Innovation Council of the University.
 - ii. Be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor, from amongst the full-time academic faculty, with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.
 - iii. Have a tenure of three years initially, which is renewable for further term/s.

32.2. Duties and Responsibilities of the Dean of Research & Innovation shall be:

- To assist the Vice-Chancellor in all matters relating to Regulations on research, innovation, intellectual property issues, etc,.
- To act as the interface between the University and external funding organizations / government authorities in furtherance of the goals and vision of the University.
- iii. To keep track of all the research activities of the University and assist the IQAC office in preparation of progress of the research activities, and to create and maintain a database regarding Academic Staff expertise.
- iv. To oversee the progress and quality of research in the University.
- To oversee the progress of Ph.D degree work of the University, including intake, organizing BoS, and overseeing coursework.
- vi. To initiate the framing of rules for industry-sponsored research and consultancy.
- vii. To create an ecosystem for entrepreneurship and innovation.
- viii. To support Academic Staff and Ph.D Scholars in procuring equipment and facilities necessary to conduct research or consultancy work.
- ix. Providing guidance for submitting proposals to funding agencies.
- x. Formulating Regulations for the conduct of research and steps to maintain suitable standards by implementing the decisions of the BoG and Academic Council.

33. Chief Human Resources Officer (CHRO)

- **33.1.** The Vice-Chancellor shall appoint the Chief Human Resources Officer with the prior written approval of the Chancellor.
- 33.2. A search-cum-selection committee comprising of a minimum number of three members and nominated by the Pro Chancellor, will recommend a panel of suitable candidates for the position of the Chief Human Resources Officer, to the Vice Chancellor.
- **33.3.** The terms and conditions of employment of the Chief Human Resources Officer shall be those contained in his contract of employment.
- **33.4.** The Chief Human Resources Officer shall have a tenure of three years initially, which is renewable for further term/s.
- 33.5. The Chief Human Resources Officer is primarily responsible for ensuring that there are appropriate systems and processes in place that focus on creating a culture that builds alignment of the Faculty, Administrative Staff and Students with the Vision and Mission of the University and create a vibrant academic community.
- **33.6.** The Chief Human Resources Officer shall be responsible;
 - to put in place systems and processes to align the faculty, staff and students with the Vision and Mission of the University;
 - to ensure the smooth and effective implementation of all Human Resource Management Systems including Recruitment & Selection; Performance Management & Development; Remuneration & Rewards, etc.;
 - to initiate and implement various interventions to enhance engagement of faculty, staff and students; to introduce special initiatives from time to time to build teamwork and collaboration in Departments/Schools and across Departments/Schools;
 - iv. to oversee the effective implementation and monitoring of guidelines and policies including Policies of the University pertaining to Upholding of Human Rights; Freedom of Expression; Environment, Health and Safety; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Prevention and Prohibition of Sexual Harassment; etc.
 - to oversee initiatives and interventions with regard to student welfare and career counselling;

St Joseph's University Statutes

- vi. to work along with the Placement Officer to develop strategies for student internships and placements and networks for contacts with industry, business and other organizations for student internships and placements;
- vii. to put in place a framework for enabling students enhance their life skills so that they emerge as well-rounded and wholesome individuals with the desire and capability to impact change and make a difference.

CHAPTER V

Appointments

34. Recruitment of Employees

- **34.1.** Every employee shall be appointed by an order containing the terms and conditions laid down in the Regulations of the University (as per SJU Act, Section 42).
- 34.2. Provided that, in respect of teaching staff, the appointments shall be in accordance with the UGC guidelines and other State guidelines and in accordance with minority rights. Whereas in case of aided non-teaching staff, the staffing pattern prescribed by the Government shall be followed.
- 34.3. Any dispute arising between the University and an employee shall be resolved in the manner provided for in the written contract and in accordance with the Regulations of the University.
- 34.4. The Board of Governors however, shall have the powers to decide, on the recommendations of the Vice-Chancellor, that one or more positions be filled by invitation from amongst the academic staff and employees of the University following the regulations given in the University Regulations created for the purpose.
- 34.5. In the event of non-availability of qualified candidates, the University shall have powers (through the Board of Management) to relax prescribed qualifications and conditions, when deemed appropriate.

35. Selection Committee(s)

The composition of Selection Committees for recruitment of employees for different positions of the University would normally be as stipulated in the respective Regulations of the University.

35.1. The qualifications and the relevant terms and conditions for employees for different positions will be as stipulated in the Regulations of the University.

- **35.2.** All appointments made in the University shall be reported to the BoM in its subsequent meeting.
- 35.3. The terms and conditions of the services of all the categories of employees of the University shall be as per the service rules, regulations and/or guidelines, as prescribed in the Regulations of the University.
- **35.4.** The University through its BoM, may make joint appointments between schools and / or departments, keeping in view the needs of the University.
- 35.5. The University through its BoM can also make joint appointments of faculty who could share their time within the country or outside the country on terms and conditions as specified by the BoM.
- **35.6.** All employees of the University shall be governed by conduct and discipline rules of the University to be formulated as per the Regulations made and which shall be circulated to them from time to time.
- **35.7.** The University may but not necessarily adopt or make appropriate seniority guidelines for different purposes from time to time.
- **35.8.** The benefits, facilities and service conditions for the eligible employees of the University and the positions held by them, shall be as per Regulations framed by the University from time to time.
- **35.9.** The Regulations governing the service conditions of the employees of the University, shall be formulated by the BoM and approved by the BoG.

36. Age of Retirement

- 36.1. Every member of academic or non-academic staff in the service of the University, shall retire from service on the afternoon on the last date of the month, in which he/she attains the age of 60 years. However, the University at its discretion and subject to the approval of the Board of Management and the Board of Governors may, for valid reasons explained in writing, ask a member of academic or non-academic staff to proceed on premature retirement.
- **36.2.** If the BoM is satisfied that such an appointment is in the interest of the University, it may, on the recommendation of the Dean of the School through Vice-Chancellor, re-

- employ a faculty on his/her superannuation for an initial period of three years, as per the criteria of appointment specified in the recruitment policy of the University.
- **36.3.** Where the date of superannuation or the expiry of the term of the re-employment of the academic staff falls due during the course of a semester, the Vice-Chancellor may allow the faculty member to continue in service till the end of the semester.

37. Appointments on Special Contracts

- **37.1.** The Vice-Chancellor may appoint academic staff on contract on such terms and conditions as it may deem fit, by adhering to the regular procedures of the recruitment policy subject to the following:
 - i. The number of such appointments shouldn't exceed 10% of the total number of academic staff in the University.
 - The qualification for appointment will be same as those applicable for appointed of regular faculty.
 - Such appointments must be made only for one year and any re-appointment for another session should be made only after reviewing the performance of the faculty member engaged on contract.
 - iv. Such appointment on contract basis may also be made, when absolutely necessary, to fill vacancies arising due to any leave vacancy.

38. Maintenance of Standards

38.1. There will be a periodic assessment of the employees of the University carried out in the manner specified in the Regulations of the University.

CHAPTER VI

Operation and Maintenance of Funds

39. The University shall establish the Statutory Funds as per the provisions of the Act.

- i. Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund;
- ii. University Endowment Fund;
- iii. General Fund and
- iv. Development Fund

In addition to these funds University with authorization from Board of Governors through the Finance Committee, may create and operate additional funds, from time to time.

40. Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund - Under Section 50 of the Act

- The University shall establish the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund as required under Section 50 of the Act, consisting of INR 25 Crores, out of which at least INR 15 Crores shall be in cash and the remaining in the form of Bank Guarantee.
- The fund so created shall be subject to the general supervision and control of the Board of Governors under Section 54 of the Act.
- iii. The University shall have power to invest the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund in such manner as provided for in the Act.
- iv. The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the Development Fund to the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, except in the event of dissolution of the University, but in no other circumstances can any amount be transferred from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund for any other purposes.

v. Seventy-five percent of the incomes received from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund shall ordinarily be used for the purpose of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty-five percent shall be reinvested in the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.

41. University Endowment Fund - Under Section 51 of the Act

- The University shall establish a University Endowment Fund which shall consist of donations and other funds received from time-to-time.
- The University shall invest the University Endowment Fund as per the decisions
 of the Board of Governors based on the recommendations of the Finance
 Committee.
- iii. The fund so created shall be subject to the general supervision and control of the Board of Governors under Section 54 of the Act.
- iv. The University Endowment Fund shall be a self-imposed fund that the University desires to maintain voluntarily and invest it responsibly to protect itself from financial challenges that may arise on account of pursuing social objectives and any unforeseen circumstances.
- v. The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the Development Fund to the University Endowment Fund. Excepting in the case of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances can its monies be transferred from the University Endowment Fund for other purposes.
- vi. Up to eighty percent of the incomes received from the University Endowment Fund may be used for the purposes of development or general work of the University. The remaining income shall be reinvested into the University Endowment Fund.
- Use of the University Endowment Funds shall be as per the guidelines laid down by the University.

42. General Fund - Under Section 51 of the Act

- i. The University shall establish a General Fund to which the following amounts shall be credited:
 - a. all fees which may be collected by the University;
 - all sums received from any other source not prohibited by any law for the time being in force;
 - c. all contributions made to the University; and
 - d. all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force.
- The funds credited to the General Fund shall be applied to meet all the recurring expenditure of the University.

43. Development Fund - Under Section 51 of the Act

- i. The University shall also establish a Development Fund to which the following funds shall be credited:
 - a. development fees which may be charged to and collected from the students;
 - all sums received from any other source for the purposes of the development of the University;
 - all contributions made by the Sponsoring Body to the University as per the guidelines laid down by the University.
 - all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force
 - e. all incomes received from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.
- The funds credited to the Development Fund from time to time shall be utilized for the development of the University.
- Under no circumstances shall the funds of the University be transferred to other educational institutions of the Sponsoring Body.

44. Accounts and Audit

- 44.1. The Annual Accounts and Balance sheet of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Finance Committee and all funds accruing to or received by the University from all sources and all amounts disbursed or paid shall be entered in the accounts maintained by the University.
- **44.2.** The Annual Accounts of the University shall be audited by an Auditor, who shall be a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.
- **44.3.** A copy of the Annual Accounts and the Balance Sheet together with the Audit Report shall be submitted to the Board of Governors before closure of the financial year.
- **44.4.** The Annual Accounts, the Balance Sheet and the Audit Report shall be considered by the Board of Governors at its meeting and the Board of Governors shall forward its copies to the Visitor and the Government and the Karnataka State Higher Education Council along with its observations.
- **44.5.** In the event of any objections and suggestions in the report of the Auditors, the State Government may issue directions to the University to rectify the mistakes and such directions shall be binding on the University.

CHAPTER VII

Admissions, Fees, Conferring and Withdrawal of Degrees

45. Admission & Fee

The admissions and fee structure for various programmes will be as per the Admission Policy of the University.

46. Conferring of Degrees

- **46.1.** The University shall have the power to award degrees, honorary degrees (*honoris causa*) and other academic distinctions to students and others who fulfil requirements of such awards in accordance with the regulations or guidelines approved by Academic Council and the BoM.
- **46.2.** These degrees and other academic distinctions shall be awarded at a convocation and / or other occasions, as per regulations and / or guidelines approved by the Academic Council.

47. Withdrawal of Degrees

- **47.1.** The Academic Council by a special resolution passed by majority of 2/3 of members voting may recommend to the BoG for the withdrawal of any degree / academic distinction conferred to any student/person by the University for good and sufficient cause. The BoG shall discuss the recommendations of the Academic Council before arriving at a final decision.
- **47.2.** Provided that no such resolutions shall be passed until a notice in writing has been given to that person calling upon him/her to show cause within such time as may be specified in the notice why such a resolution should not be passed and until his/her objections, if any, and any evidence he/she may produce in support of them, have been considered by the BoG.

CHAPTER VIII

Miscellaneous and Other Provisions

48. Mode of Proof of University Record

A copy of any receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding or resolution of any authority or committee of the University or other documents in possession of the University or any entry in any register duly maintained by the University, if certified by the Registrar, shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of such receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding, resolution or document or the existence of entry in the register and shall be admitted as evidence of the matters and transactions therein recorded where the original thereof would, if produced, have been admissible in evidence.

49. Formation of Special Entities (SPVs)

Creation of Entities to Promote Academic and Research Excellence: The Board of Governors, may lay down suitable norms and guidelines for establishing entities such as Special Purpose Vehicles (SPVs), under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Societies Registration Act. 1860 (21 of 1860).

50. Co-operation and Collaborations

- 50.1. The University shall be free to seek co-operation and collaborations, with or without formal agreements, with other universities / institutions of higher learning and / or other organizations and / or industries in India or abroad.
- **50.2.** The University may enter into Memoranda of Understanding with the entities mentioned above (in 50.1), detailing the conditions of such collaborations including extent of area of collaboration mutually agreed upon.
- **50.3.** The Registrar will be the authorized signatory of all such memoranda of understanding on behalf of the University after approval by the Vice-Chancellor.

- 50.4. The University shall frame appropriate regulations and / or guidelines to deal with all such collaborations, which may include the financial provisions, grants, transfer of credits for academic work, intellectual property and the exchange programmes to be carried out.
- **50.5.** All the memoranda of understanding / agreement shall be reported to the BoG at its subsequent meeting.

51. Delegation of Powers

Subject to the provisions of the Act and the Statutes, an Authority or the Officer of the University may delegate in writing, the powers to any other Authority or Officer or person with the approval of the Chancellor, subject to the condition that overall responsibility for the exercise of the powers so delegated shall continue to rest with the officer or the Authority delegating such powers.

52. Resolution of Disputes

- **52.1.** The Vice-Chancellor shall be responsible for resolution of the disputes and grievances amongst and of the employees / faculty / students of the University,
- 52.2. The Vice-Chancellor may constitute appropriate grievance redressal mechanisms for arbitration and / or resolution of such disputes and grievances. Such disputes are to be resolved with recommendations of rewards or penalties if any. However, the Chancellor's pronouncement on all such disputes shall be final and binding on all the parties concerned.

53. Ownership and Exploitation of Knowledge

- 53.1. The University will frame appropriate regulations and / or guidelines regarding safeguarding intellectual property, copyrights and other such provisions and exploitations.
- **53.2.** The University will frame appropriate regulations and / or guidelines regarding consulting and testing activities as well as royalties by the faculty and employees of the University and sharing of the fees so received for such purposes.

53.3. The University will formulate appropriate regulations and / or guidelines for such entrepreneurship activities, innovation and incubation facilities for students / faculty / employees of the University.

54. Decisions of the Board of Governors

- **54.1.** The decisions of the BoG on all interpretations and all questions relating to interpretations of Statutes, shall be final and binding.
- **54.2.** The BoG shall have the power to make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the earlier Statutes and / or Rules, as per Section 25 (6)(v) & 37 of the Act.

55. Technology Enhanced Learning Programs

55.1. The Board of Management, with the approval of Board of Governors, may create suitable structures and procedures to promote Technology Enhanced Learning Programs and the Board of Governors may lay down necessary norms and guidelines in this regard.

56. Right to Appeal

- 56.1 In case of disciplinary actions by the University against its employee or student, the aggrieved employee or students shall have a right to appeal to the corresponding Cell/Committees laid down as per Regulations of the University.
- **56.2** The University shall have the following special provisions as per UGC norms;
 - i. Anti-Ragging Cell
 - ii. Equal Opportunity Cell
 - iii. Gender Sensitization Cell
 - iv. Internal Complaints Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment
 - v. Parents' Council
 - vi. Student Grievance Redressal Cell
 - vii. Faculty Grievance Redressal Cell
 - viii. Admission Grievance Redressal Cell
 - ix. Discipline Committee
 - x. Ethics Committee

57 Constitution of Committees

Any Authority of the University mentioned in Section 24 of SJU Act, shall be empowered to constitute a committee of such Authority, consisting of such members and possessing powers as the Authority may deem fit.

58 Protection of Action Taken in Good Faith

No suit or other legal proceedings shall lie against any officer or other employee of the University for anything, which is done in good faith or intended to be done in pursuance of the provisions of SJU Act, the Statues or the Regulations or the Rules.

59 Transitional Provisions

Notwithstanding anything contained in the SJU Act, the First Vice-Chancellor may, with the previous approval of the Chancellor, discharge any of the functions of the University for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the SJU Act, and for that purpose may exercise any powers or perform any duties which by the SJU Act are to be exercised or performed by any Authority of the University until such Authority comes into existence as provided by the SJU Act.

Further, such of the students who were admitted to the institution shall continue to complete their course or programme in the University until they qualify to receive their Degree/Diploma/Certificate from the University.

60 Disqualifications from Membership of an Authority

A person shall be disqualified for being a member of any of the administering bodies or positions of responsibility in the University, if he/she -

- i. is of unsound mind and stands so declared by a competent court;
- ii. is an un-discharged insolvent;
- iii. has been convicted of any offence involving moral turpitude;
- iv. is conducting or engaging himself/herself in private coaching classes;

- has been punished for indulging in or promoting unfair practice in the conduct of any examination, in any form, anywhere;
- vi. is considered by the Sponsoring Body unfit to hold the post, such an opinion to be recorded in writing;
- vii. is conducting or engaging himself/herself in activities that are in conflict with the activities and interests of the university;
- viii. has behaved in a manner which is or is proven to be detrimental to the interests of the University;
- ix. has been punished for indulging in or promoting unfair practices;
- x. has violated any provisions stipulated from time to time, by any of the regulatory authorities and are applicable to the University and / or its Authorities.

61 Rules of Business and Meetings of the Authorities

- **61.1** The authorities mentioned in Section 24 of the Act shall frame rules relating to conduct of their meetings and business by them.
- 61.2 In exercise of Section 24 and 46 of the Act, the University may constitute different committees, authorities, boards etc., which shall exercise powers and functions in terms of a representative committee and they stand automatically dissolved after their tenure or when the purpose prescribed is served, whichever is earlier.

62 Centre for Distance / Online / Continuing Education

- **62.1** The University may establish a Centre for Distance Education, for which appropriate regulations and / or guidelines shall be formulated with the approval of BoG.
- 62.2 Life-Long-Learning and Continuing Education: The BoG may create suitable procedures and structures to offer life-long-learning and continuing education programmes and lay down suitable Regulations and guidelines in this regard.

63 Secrecy and Confidentiality

63.1 All Officers, Members of Authorities and Employees of the University, including nominees shall maintain strict confidentiality about any and all information obtained during or in connection with the work of the University. This will be mandatory even after cessation of their service with the University.
