The student shall submit a portfolio of writing comprising

- a. 6 responses to prompts in creative writing unassisted by AI, (each of 350-500 words)
- b. 1 essay of 1000-1500 words developed from one of the prompts above with a discussion of the development process
- c. a blog in daily journal style based on newspaper reading for four weeks

- d. 1 reporting story of 250 words length chosen from events on campus-the student must attempt a minimum of three stories, and pick the best attempt.
- e. 1 journaling piece of 750 words length to accompany the reporting piece,
- f. a reflection of 1000 words.

Internal Assessment: 40 marks

- Mid-Semester Test: 20 marks
- Assignments: 20 marks

Continuous Internal Assessment:

10 marks are assigned to the students' responses to tasks given in class

10 marks are assigned for presentations/submissions based on self-study topics. Students will pick one film listed on the syllabus and work on a presentation/curate an exhibition
